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Introduction

Thank you for upgrading to Sibelius 6, the very latest advance in the world's favorite music software. We've listened to what you've been asking for, and have added amazing enhancements for writing, playing, teaching, learning and publishing music – many of them never found in notation software before.

Whether you use Sibelius professionally, in education, or just for fun, we're sure you'll agree that it represents a giant leap forwards for notation software.

About this booklet

This booklet tells you how to install your new version of Sibelius, tells you how to get started with the main new features, then summarizes the remainder of the improvements, listing them in the order in which they occur in Sibelius Reference, so that you can find the right topics easily for further information.

This booklet does not attempt to explain in full how to use each of the hundreds of new features and improvements in this version: refer to Sibelius Reference (see below) for full details.

We strongly recommend that you read this booklet in its entirety before you use your upgrade. At the very least, you *must* follow the upgrade instructions on the next few pages.

Sibelius Reference

Sibelius 6's documentation is split into two: the Handbook, which tells new users how to install the software and introduces them to its basic features; and Reference, which explains every feature of the program in detail. You don't need the Sibelius 6 Handbook so it isn't included with this upgrade.

Reference is available on-screen from within Sibelius 6: simply choose **Help ▶ Documentation ▶ Sibelius Reference** (shortcut **F1** or **⌘?**), and it will open in your default PDF reader, typically Adobe Reader (Windows) or Preview (Mac).

Sibelius Reference is optionally available as a printed book. If you would like to buy a copy, please visit www.sibelius.com/buy for more information.

Here are the main additions and changes to Sibelius Reference since Sibelius 5:

- **5.11 Plug-ins** has been split into a new chapter, **6. Plug-ins**, with each submenu in the **Plug-ins** menu in its own topic
- All the new features and improvements are documented either in entirely new topics or extensively revised existing topics. You will see directions to these topics at the appropriate points in this booklet.

In your upgrade pack

In addition to this booklet, check that you have received all of the following items:

- Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM
- **Latest information and technical help** sheet
- Reference book (if you opted to purchase it along with your upgrade).

Installation

Upgrading on Windows

Before you begin

If you are installing your upgrade onto the same computer as your previous version of Sibelius, there's no need to uninstall your previous version of Sibelius before installing the upgrade.

If you are installing Sibelius 6 on a new computer, you *do not* need to install your previous version of Sibelius on your new computer in order to install your upgrade.

Minimum requirements

Minimum requirements for Sibelius 6 alone:

Windows XP 32-bit SP2 or later, Windows Vista 32-bit SP1 or later, Windows 7 32-bit or 64-bit,
512MB+ RAM, 550MB hard disk space, DVD-ROM drive

Additional recommendations for using Sibelius Sounds Essentials:

Intel Core Duo or AMD Turion or better, 1GB+ total physical RAM (2GB recommended), 3.5GB
total hard disk space, ASIO-compatible soundcard

You can use Sibelius Sounds Essentials if your computer doesn't meet the recommended requirements, but you may find that you cannot use as many sounds simultaneously.

You must be running Windows XP Service Pack 2 or later to install and run Sibelius 6. If you have Windows 95, Windows 98, Windows Me, Windows 2000 or Windows NT 4.x, you need to purchase an upgrade to a more recent version of the Windows operating system.

How to determine if you are running Windows XP SP2 or SP3

If you have Windows XP but are unsure whether or not you have Windows XP SP2 or SP3:

- Click the **Start** button, then choose **Run...**
- Type **winver** in the **Open** box, and hit **Return** (on the main keyboard)
- You will see a simple window, like this:



You should see **Service Pack 2** or **Service Pack 3** at the end of the second line of text. If you don't, then you need to update: the simplest way of doing this is to download it automatically by choosing **Windows Update** from the Start menu. If the computer on which you want to run Sibelius isn't connected to the Internet, you can obtain Windows XP Service Pack 2 on CD-ROM or via a special

download that can be burned to CD and deployed on another computer. For more details, see <http://www.microsoft.com/windowsxp/sp2/default.msp>

Multiple copies and site licenses

If you have more than one copy of Sibelius using the same serial number, such as a 5-pack, second registration or laptop copy, simply follow the same upgrading instructions on each computer.

If you have more than one Sibelius serial number (e.g. two 5-packs), follow the upgrading instructions on each computer, using the original Sibelius serial number used on that computer. If you're not sure which serial number is used on which computer, run your previous version, and choose **Help ▶ About Sibelius**: your serial number appears at the bottom of the window.

If you have a Sibelius network license, please read the separate Sibelius 6 Licence Server User Guide enclosed in the upgrade pack.

Administrator privileges

You must install Sibelius using a user account on your computer with administrator privileges. In order to register Sibelius after installing it, you must either be using an administrator user account, or be able to provide an administrator username and password when prompted.

Therefore we recommend that you install Sibelius 6, then after installing it, launch it and register it *as an administrator user*.

After having registered the software, we recommend that you run Sibelius (like all other applications) as a non-privileged user, to increase the security of your system.

If you're the only person who uses your computer, or you don't know anything about user accounts or administrator privileges on your computer, you can safely ignore the above and install the software as usual.

Installing your upgrade

- Exit any programs that are running. It's a particularly good idea to exit any anti-virus or anti-spyware programs loaded automatically at start-up.
- Take the Sibelius DVD-ROM out of its case, put it (labeled side up) in the DVD-ROM drive of the computer, and close the drive slot
- Wait for a few seconds. The DVD-ROM drive should start up and a dialog will appear on the screen. (If there's no sign of activity after a while, click the **Start** menu, choose **Run** and type **D:\autorun**, where **D** is the letter of your DVD-ROM drive, then hit **Return** on the main keyboard.)
- On Windows Vista or Windows 7, you may see a small window called **AutoPlay** appear. Under **Install or run program**, click **Run autorun.exe**.
- In the main installation window, click **Install Sibelius 6** to start upgrading Sibelius
- On Windows Vista or Windows 7, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy for the installation to proceed.
- On Windows XP, if you do not have the Microsoft Windows Installer installed, you will be told that it must be installed. Click **Install**, and wait while the Windows Installer kit is installed. This may take a couple of minutes.

- Similarly, if you are running Windows XP and do not have the Microsoft .NET Framework 2.0 installed, you will be told that it must be installed. Click **Install**, then if you are prompted to read a license agreement, click **Accept** to accept the terms of the license agreement you are shown, and then wait patiently while the .NET Framework is installed. This may take a couple of minutes.
- After a few more seconds, a window appears that says **Welcome to the Sibelius 6 Installation Wizard**. Click **Next**.
- You are given the opportunity to read the Sibelius license agreement, which is also at the end of Reference. Choose the **I accept the license agreement** radio button, then click **Next**.
- The installer suggests a folder to install Sibelius into. Unless you have strong feelings about where you want Sibelius to go and you know how to alter it, leave this set to the default. You're asked if you want to install Sibelius for **Anyone who uses this computer** or **Only for me**, which determines whether everybody who uses your computer will see a shortcut to Sibelius on the Desktop, or just you. We recommend you leave it on **Anyone who uses this computer**. Click **Next**.
- It tells you you're now ready to install Sibelius. Click **Next**.
- Things flash and zoom past on the screen as Sibelius is installed. This may take several minutes.
- When the installer has completed, click **Finish** to return to the window that first appeared when you inserted the DVD-ROM.

Before you run Sibelius 6 for the first time, you should now consider whether to install any other applications from the Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM.

Installing Sibelius Sounds Essentials

Sibelius Sounds Essentials is a high-quality library of sounds for use with Sibelius. Even if you are upgrading from Sibelius 5 and already have the version of Sibelius Sounds Essentials that was supplied with Sibelius 5 installed, you should install the updated version from your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM. To install it:

- In the main installation window, click **Install Sibelius Sounds Essentials**
- After a few moments, the installer will start.
- On Windows Vista or Windows 7, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy for the installation to proceed.
- A window appears that says **Welcome to the Sibelius Sounds Essentials for Sibelius 6 Installation Wizard**. Click **Next**.
- You are given the opportunity to read the license agreement. Choose the **I accept the agreement** radio button, then click **Next**.
- The installer suggests a folder to install the sounds into. Unless you have strong feelings about where you want the sounds to go and you know how to alter the location, leave this set to the default. Click **Next**.
- It tells you you're now ready to install Sibelius Sounds Essentials. Click **Install**.
- Things flash and zoom past on the screen as the sounds are installed. This will take several minutes, so please be patient.
- When the installer has completed, click **Finish**.

Installing PhotoScore Lite

Unless you have purchased PhotoScore Ultimate along with your upgrade or already have PhotoScore Ultimate (or an earlier version of PhotoScore Professional) installed, you should now install the latest version of PhotoScore Lite from your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM:

- In the main installation window, click **Install PhotoScore Lite**
- On Windows Vista, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy for the installation to proceed.
- Click **Next** to see the license agreement for PhotoScore Lite. Read it and click **Next**
- You're asked to fill in a few details: type in your **Name**; the **Product ID** field is filled in for you. When you've filled in the form, click **Next**.
- PhotoScore Lite tells you where it will be installed; again, you can change this if you have strong feelings about it. Otherwise, click **Next**.
- Click **Next** once more and PhotoScore Lite will be installed, then click **Finish**.

Installing AudioScore Lite

AudioScore Lite is an application from Neuratron, the makers of PhotoScore, that automatically transcribes music that you sing or play an acoustic instrument into a microphone, so that you can send it to Sibelius for further editing.

Unless you have purchased AudioScore Ultimate along with your upgrade, or already have AudioScore Ultimate (or an earlier version of AudioScore Professional) installed, you should now install AudioScore Lite from your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM:

- In the main installation window, click **Install AudioScore Lite**
- On Windows Vista, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy for the installation to proceed.
- Click **Next** to see the license agreement for AudioScore Lite. Read it and click **Next**
- You're asked to fill in a few details: type in your **Name**; the **Product ID** field is filled in for you. When you've filled in the form, click **Next**.
- AudioScore Lite tells you where it will be installed; again, you can change this if you have strong feelings about it. Otherwise, click **Next**.
- Click **Next** once more and AudioScore Lite will be installed, then click **Finish**.

Installing Sibelius Scorch

You should now install the latest version of Sibelius Scorch, the free web browser plug-in for viewing, playing, transposing and printing Sibelius scores on the Internet:

- First, quit any web browsers that are running.
- In the main installation window, click **Install Scorch**
- It may take up to a minute or longer for the Scorch installer to start: please be patient. Eventually, a window appears that says **Welcome to the Sibelius Scorch (all browsers) Setup Wizard**. Click **Next**.
- You are given the opportunity to read the Scorch license agreement. Read it, choose the **I Agree** radio button, then click **Next**.

Installation

- You are prompted to choose an installation folder for Scorch. Again, simply click **Next**.
- It tells you you're now ready to install Scorch. Click **Next**.
- On Windows Vista or Windows 7, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy for the installation to proceed.
- Things flash and whizz across the screen as Scorch is installed. This only takes a few moments.
- When the installer has completed, click **Close**.

Running for the first time

Now you're ready to run Sibelius 6 – see **Running for the first time** on page 15.

Uninstalling older versions of Sibelius

If you have an older version of Sibelius installed on your computer, it is unaffected by your upgrade to Sibelius 6, so you can continue to use the older version if you want. You cannot, however, re-register your older version online after upgrading to Sibelius 6, so you cannot move your old version to a new computer (if you need to do this, please contact technical help).

Unless you need to use one of the small number of features that has been removed from Sibelius 6 (such as importing Finale, SCORE and Acorn Sibelius files), you are recommended to uninstall your older version. To uninstall Sibelius, go to **Start ▶ Settings ▶ Control Panel**, and double-click **Add/Remove Programs** (Windows XP) or **Programs and Features** (Windows Vista or Windows 7).

You should see your older version of Sibelius listed there (as e.g. **Sibelius 5**). Select the older version and then click **Change/Remove** (Windows XP) or **Uninstall** (Windows Vista or Windows 7). *Make sure you do not select Sibelius 6 as this will delete the new version.* Then follow the instructions on the screen to uninstall the older version.

Upgrading on Mac

Important

If you are installing your upgrade onto the same computer as your previous version of Sibelius, there's no need to uninstall your previous version of Sibelius before installing the upgrade.

If you are installing Sibelius 6 on a new computer, you *do not* need to install your previous version of Sibelius on your new computer in order to install your upgrade.

Minimum requirements

Minimum requirements for Sibelius 6 alone:

Mac OS X 10.4.11 or later, Mac OS X 10.5.7 or later, or Mac OS X 10.6, 512MB+ RAM, 550MB hard disk space, DVD-ROM drive

Additional recommendations for using Sibelius Sounds Essentials:

Intel Core Duo or better, 1GB+ total physical RAM (2GB recommended), 3.5GB total hard disk space

You can use Sibelius Sounds Essentials if your computer doesn't meet the recommended requirements, but you may find that you cannot use as many sounds simultaneously.

If you are running a version of Mac OS X earlier than Mac OS X 10.4, you cannot install and run Sibelius. You should upgrade Mac OS X now, although this normally incurs an upgrade fee. See www.apple.com for details.

It is recommended that you are running the most up-to-date version of Mac OS X to use Sibelius. Choose the **Software Update** pane from **System Preferences** to check that you are using the latest version.

How to determine if you are running Mac OS X 10.4 Tiger or later

Choose **About This Mac** from the Apple menu. You will see a simple window, like this:



Just below the large text that reads **Mac OS X** you will see text that reads something like **Version 10.4.11**. Provided the first part of this number is **10.4** or greater, you are running Mac OS X 10.4 Tiger or a newer version of Mac OS X, and you can install and run Sibelius 6.

Multiple copies and site licenses

If you have more than one copy of Sibelius using the same serial number, such as a 5-pack, second registration or laptop copy, simply follow the same upgrading instructions on each computer.

If you have more than one Sibelius serial number (e.g. two 5-packs), follow the upgrading instructions on each computer, using the original Sibelius serial number used on that computer. If

you're not sure which serial number is used on which computer, run your previous version, and choose **Sibelius ▶ About Sibelius**: your serial number appears at the bottom of the window.

If you're the only person who uses your computer, or you don't know anything about user accounts or administrator privileges on your computer, you can safely ignore the above and install the software as usual.

Installing your upgrade

- Take the Sibelius DVD-ROM out of its case, put it (labeled side up) in the DVD-ROM drive of the computer, and close the drive slot.
- Wait for a few seconds. An icon for the DVD, labeled **Sibelius 6**, should appear on your desktop, and a window should open automatically; if it doesn't, double-click the **Sibelius 6** icon.
- In the window that appears, double-click the **Install Sibelius 6** icon, which will start the installation process.
- A window appears, titled **Welcome to the Sibelius 6 Installer**. Click **Continue**.
- You are given the opportunity to read the Sibelius license agreement, which is also at the end of Reference. Read it, click **Continue**, then **Agree**.
- You are told how much space on your computer will be used by installing Sibelius 6. (If you are reinstalling Sibelius 6, you may be told that the installation will take up almost no space on your computer.) You have to install Sibelius on your Mac's boot disk, so don't click **Change Install Location**: simply click **Install**.
- You are prompted for your administrator password: type it and click **OK**.
- A progress bar appears as the software is installed. This may take several minutes.
- Eventually, you will be informed that installation was successful. Click **Close**.

Before you run Sibelius 6 for the first time, you should now consider whether to install any other applications from the Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM.

Installing Sibelius Sounds Essentials

Sibelius Sounds Essentials is a high-quality library of sounds for use with Sibelius. Even if you are upgrading from Sibelius 5 and already have the version of Sibelius Sounds Essentials that was supplied with Sibelius 5 installed, you should install the updated version from your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM. To install it:

- Double-click **Install Sibelius Sounds Essentials** to start the installation.
- A window appears, titled **Welcome to the Sibelius Sounds Essentials for Sibelius 6 Installer**. Click **Continue**.

- You are given the opportunity to read the license agreement. Read it, click **Continue**, then **Agree**.
- Sibelius Sounds Essentials must be installed on your Mac's boot disk (you can move it later, if you want – see **Moving Sibelius Sounds Essentials** below), so don't click **Change Install Location**: simply click **Install**.
- You are prompted for your administrator password: type it and click **OK**.
- A progress bar appears as the software is installed. This will take several minutes.
- After a few minutes, you will be informed that installation was successful. Click **Close**.

Installing Scorch

You should install the latest version of Sibelius Scorch (which allows you to view, play, transpose and print Sibelius scores on the internet):

- First, quit any web browsers that are running.
- Double-click **Install Sibelius Scorch** to start the installation.
- A window appears, titled **Welcome to the Sibelius Scorch Installer**. Click **Continue**.
- You are shown the license agreement. Read it, click **Continue**, then **Agree**.
- Scorch must be installed on your Mac's boot disk, so don't click **Change Install Location**: simply click **Install**.
- You are prompted to type your computer's administrator password. Type it, and click **OK**.
- You are given the opportunity to read Scorch's license agreement; read it, and click **Accept**.
- On the next screen, simply click **Install**.
- A progress bar zooms across the screen, and you're then told that installation was successful. Click **Close**.

Installing PhotoScore Lite

Unless you have purchased PhotoScore Ultimate along with your upgrade or already have PhotoScore Ultimate (or an earlier version of PhotoScore Professional) installed, you should now install the latest version of PhotoScore Lite:

- Double-click **Install PhotoScore Lite** to start the installation.
- A window appears, titled **Welcome to the PhotoScore Lite Installer**. Click **Continue**.
- You are shown PhotoScore Lite's license agreement; read it, click **Continue**, then **Agree**.
- On the next screen, simply click **Install**.
- You are prompted to type your computer's administrator password. Type it, and click **OK**.
- A progress bar zooms across the screen, and you're then told that installation was successful. Click **Close**.

Installing AudioScore Lite

AudioScore Lite is an application from Neuratron, the makers of PhotoScore, that automatically transcribes music that you sing or play an acoustic instrument into a microphone, so that you can send it to Sibelius for further editing.

Unless you have purchased AudioScore Ultimate along with your upgrade, or already have AudioScore Ultimate (or an earlier version of AudioScore Professional) installed, you should now install AudioScore Lite from your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM:

- Double-click **Install AudioScore Lite** to start the installation.
- A window appears, titled **Welcome to the AudioScore Lite Installer**. Click **Continue**.
- You are shown AudioScore Lite's license agreement; read it, click **Continue**, then **Agree**
- On the next screen, choose your Mac's boot disk, then click **Continue**
- You are told how much disk space the installation will use: click **Install**.
- You are prompted to type your computer's administrator password. Type it, and click **OK**.
- A progress bar zooms across the screen, and you're then told that installation was successful. Click **Close**.

Running for the first time

Now you're ready to run Sibelius 6 – see **Running for the first time** on page 15.

Moving Sibelius Sounds Essentials

To move Sibelius Sounds Essentials to another volume, e.g. an external hard disk, after installation:

- Quit Sibelius, if it is running.
- In the Finder, go to **/Library/Application Support/Sibelius Software/Sibelius Sounds**.
- You will see at least two folders: **Essentials for Sibelius 6** and **Libraries**.
- Drag the **Essentials for Sibelius 6** folder to your preferred location. *Do not* move the **Libraries** folder.
- Run Sibelius again: you will be told that Sibelius is unable to find the Essentials sound library. Click **Yes** to choose the new location, then click **Choose**. You will be prompted for your administrator password, so provide it and click **OK**.

Uninstalling older versions of Sibelius

If you have an older version of Sibelius installed on your computer, it is unaffected by your upgrade to Sibelius 6, so you can continue to use the older version if you want. You cannot, however, re-register your older version online after upgrading to Sibelius 6, so you cannot move your old version to a new computer (if you need to do this, please contact technical help).

Unless you need to use one of the small number of features that has been removed from Sibelius 6 (such as importing Finale, SCORE and Acorn Sibelius files), you are recommended to uninstall your older version.

Warning for users upgrading from Sibelius 2

If you have upgraded from Sibelius 2, beware that the default location for scores you have created is the **Scores** folder inside the **Sibelius 2** program folder. So before you uninstall Sibelius 2, you should first move your **Scores** folder out of the **Sibelius 2** program folder to somewhere safe to avoid deleting all your music!

Now find the old folder (probably called **Sibelius 2** or **Sibelius 3**) or the **Sibelius 4** or **Sibelius 5** application icon and drag it to the Trash.

Running for the first time

Run Sibelius 6 either by double-clicking the **Sibelius 6** icon on your desktop (Windows) or in your **Applications** folder (Mac). Then the following will happen:

- You are told that Sibelius 6 must be run for the first time using an administrator account; click **OK**:
 - On Windows Vista or Windows 7, your screen may now go dark and a window titled **User Account Control** will appear. Click **Continue** to tell Windows that you are happy to proceed, or enter an administrator password if prompted.
 - On Windows XP, you may be prompted for an administrator password, in which case enter it.
 - On Mac, you will be prompted for your administrator password: type it and click **OK**.
- Now you are asked to enter your Sibelius serial number. You will find this on the back of the CD case that your *original* version of Sibelius came in; it's the number beginning with **S**. Type it and click **OK**.
- You will then be prompted to register Sibelius. You should do this now, so choose the **Using this computer's Internet connection** radio button and click **Next**, then follow the instructions on the screen. If your computer does not have an Internet connection, choose the **Using another computer's Internet connection** radio button, then follow the instructions on the screen. On Mac, you may be prompted to provide your administrator password again at this point, in which case do so.
- Click **Finish**. You will be told that Sibelius has been registered successfully.
- Now the pretty Sibelius 6 splash screen appears, accompanied by the start-up music.
- When Sibelius has loaded, the **Quick Start** dialog appears. Switch off **Show this each time Sibelius starts** if this kind of thing annoys you.

Now you've finished installing Sibelius, take your Sibelius 6 DVD-ROM and put it in your existing Sibelius CD case. It's important that you put your new DVD into the old case, because the case has your serial number printed on the back.

Opening files from previous versions

When you first open in Sibelius 6 a score that was last saved in an earlier version of Sibelius, the **Update Score** dialog appears. This dialog offers you the chance to switch on options in your score that will improve its appearance or make new features available. If you click **Cancel**, the file will not be opened; if you click **OK**, the file will be opened with the options chosen applied to it.

For further details about the options in the **Update Score** dialog, see **9.7 Opening files from previous versions** in Sibelius Reference.

Automatic changes

Depending on the version of Sibelius in which the score was last saved, Sibelius 6 also makes some automatic changes that are not optional and therefore do not appear in the **Update Score** dialog:

- If the score was last saved in Sibelius 4, then all staff type changes, transposition changes and text that triggers a change of playback sound (e.g. “To Flute”) are converted to instrument changes, which were added in Sibelius 5 and combine the old staff type change and transposition change objects into a single object.
- If the score was last saved in Sibelius 3, then:
 - A number of useful text styles are created in your score, if they were not already there (including **Plain text**, **Lyrics above staff**, **Lyrics (chorus)**, **Time signatures (one staff only)**, **Repeat (D.C./D.S./To Coda)**, **Block Lyrics**, **Timecode**, **Hit points**, **Duration at end of score**, **Chord diagram fingering**, etc.)
 - A number of line styles are created in your score, if they were not already there (including all the *rit./accel.* lines)
- If the score was last saved in Sibelius 2, existing coda and segno symbols are converted to system symbols, so that the repeats can be played back properly. This will only affect the appearance of a score if more than one row of system objects is visible in each system (as configured in **House Style ▶ System Object Positions**).

Playback of existing scores

You may find that your scores do not play back precisely the same in Sibelius 6 as they did in Sibelius 5 or earlier versions. For example:

- If you previously used Sibelius Sounds Essentials in Sibelius 5, your score will automatically play back using the improved Sibelius Sounds Essentials sound library included with Sibelius 6.
- If you previously used Kontakt Silver or Kontakt Gold for playback, this is no longer available in Sibelius 6; it has been replaced by the Sibelius Sounds Essentials library, which includes many more sounds than either of these older libraries.
- If you used a MIDI device for which no sound set was available, and achieved correct playback by manually setting the MIDI channel and program number of each staff in the Mixer, you will have to set this up again in Sibelius 6.
- If you used MIDI messages to achieve advanced playback effects, beware that these may not produce the same effect in Sibelius 6 (e.g. because the playback device you used in a previous version is no longer available), especially if your score is now played back by a different device.

- If you defined your own unpitched percussion staff types in Sibelius 4 or earlier, they will not automatically play back correctly in Sibelius 6. You will need to use the **House Style ▶ Edit Instruments** dialog to update the staff type to play back correctly.  **2.21 Percussion** and **7.12 Edit Instruments** in Reference.

Updating a score after saving it in Sibelius 6

If you choose not to switch off some or all of the options in the **Update Score** dialog but later want to enable various new features, the simplest thing to do is use **House Style ▶ Import House Style** to import one of the supplied house styles.

Restoring other files

You may have written or customized plug-ins, manuscript papers, feature sets, Arrange styles, etc. in earlier versions of Sibelius. Each version of Sibelius stores these files in different locations, and if you want to use them in Sibelius 6, you'll need to copy them manually from their old location to the appropriate new one. To find the location where Sibelius 6 keeps user-created files:

On Windows:

- Double-click **My Computer** or open a **Windows Explorer** window
- Choose **Tools ▶ Folder Options**, and click the **View** tab
- Under **Advanced Settings**, make sure **Show hidden files and folders** is selected
- Click **OK** to close the **Folder Options** dialog
- Navigate to the appropriate folder for your version of Windows:
 - Windows XP: **C:\Documents and Settings\username\Application Data**
 - Windows Vista or Windows 7: **C:\Users\username\AppData\Roaming**
- You should now see a folder called **Sibelius Software**, in which case double-click the folder to go inside it. If you don't see that folder, choose **File ▶ New Folder**, type **Sibelius Software** as the name of the folder, then double-click the newly-created folder to go inside it.
- Choose **File ▶ New Folder** again, and type **Sibelius 6** as the name of the folder. Double-click the newly-created folder to go inside it.

On Mac:

- Open a new **Finder** window
- Navigate to **/Users/username/Library/Application Support**
- You should now see a folder called **Sibelius Software**, in which case double-click the folder to go inside it. If you don't see that folder, type **⇧⌘N** to create a new folder, and type **Sibelius Software** as the name of the folder. Double-click the newly-created folder to go inside it.
- Type **⇧⌘N** again, and type **Sibelius 6** as the name of the folder. Double-click the newly-created folder to go inside it.

This is the location in which Sibelius 6 expects to find customized data like plug-ins, manuscript papers, and so on, each type within its own folder.

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 5 or Sibelius 4 and have modified any of these files, you will already have a folder called **Sibelius 5** or **Sibelius 4** in the same location. You can simply drag the folders from the old folder into your new **Sibelius 6** folder.

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 1, Sibelius 2 or Sibelius 3, you will find your user-edited files inside the program folder for your old version (e.g. for Sibelius 3 on Windows, look in C:\Program Files\Sibelius Software\Sibelius 3, or for Sibelius 2 on Mac, look in /Applications/Sibelius 2 Folder). You will need to move *only those files that you have customized (and want to keep)* from their old location to the new one.

Whichever version you're upgrading from, note that:

- Due to changes in ManuScript, plug-ins you have created or edited yourself may no longer work in Sibelius 6; consult the ManuScript documentation in the **Extras** folder for more details.
- Due to changes in sound sets, sound sets created in any version of Sibelius prior to Sibelius 5 will not work in Sibelius 6 (but sound sets from Sibelius 5 work fine in Sibelius 6).
- To take advantage of many of Sibelius 6's new features, you will need to import one of the new Sibelius 6 house styles into your existing scores and manuscript papers, or else recreate your own manuscript papers from scratch in Sibelius 6.

Restoring playback configurations from Sibelius 5

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 5, you may have created one or more playback configurations that you would like to continue using in Sibelius 6.

First, find your Sibelius 5 playback configurations, in the **Playback Configurations** folder inside your user-level Sibelius 5 folder – see **Restoring other files** above.

For each configuration you want to use in Sibelius 6, simply copy the *configname.xml* file and *configname data* folder from the Sibelius 5 **Playback Configurations** folder to the Sibelius 6 **Playback Configurations** folder, which will exist already, provided you have already run Sibelius 6 at least once.

Now restart Sibelius 6, and you should find your custom playback configurations listed in the **Configuration** menu at the top of **Play ▶ Playback Devices**.

Upgrading Sibelius Sounds products

If you purchased any Sibelius Sounds product for use with your old version of Sibelius, you can obtain an update to use that product with Sibelius 6.

Kontakt Silver and Kontakt Gold

If you used the Kontakt Silver sounds that were supplied with Sibelius 3 or Sibelius 4, or the Kontakt Gold sounds that were available for separate purchase, unfortunately you cannot update these sounds for Sibelius 6. Use the new Sibelius Sounds Essentials library instead, which contains many more, higher-quality sounds than Kontakt Silver or Kontakt Gold.

(An exceptional case is that if you are upgrading from Sibelius 5, but previously owned Kontakt Gold for use with Sibelius 3 or Sibelius 4, you should already have upgraded Kontakt Gold to work with Kontakt Player 2 for Sibelius 5, in which case you can continue using Kontakt Gold with Sibelius 6, provided you still have Kontakt Player 2 and the Sibelius Gold library installed.)

GPO Sibelius Edition

If you purchased GPO Sibelius Edition for use with Sibelius 4, you can download an update to the Kontakt Player 2 version of GPO, which works with Sibelius 6. Find your GPO Sibelius Edition serial number (printed on its DVD case), and type it into the form here:

Follow the instructions on the web site to download the GPO Kontakt Player 2 installer and copy the sounds from your GPO Sibelius Edition DVD-ROM to the new folder on your hard disk.

Sibelius Sounds Rock and Pop Collection

If you purchased Sibelius Sounds Rock and Pop Collection for Sibelius 4, you can download an update to the Kontakt Player 2 version, which works with Sibelius 6. Find your Sibelius Sounds Rock and Pop Collection serial number (printed on its DVD case), and type it into the form here:

Follow the instructions on the web site to download the Rock and Pop Collection installer and copy the sounds from your Rock and Pop Collection DVD-ROM to the new folder on your hard disk. You will also need to install Kontakt Player 2.2.4 from here:

If you purchased Rock and Pop Collection for use with Sibelius 5, you can simply continue using your existing version with Sibelius 6. Simply create a playback configuration with one or more instances of Kontakt Player 2, and choose **Sibelius Rock and Pop** as the sound set –  **4.12 Playback Devices** in Sibelius Reference for more information.

Sibelius Sounds Choral and Sibelius Sounds World Music

If you purchased Sibelius Sounds Choral or Sibelius Sounds World Music for use with Sibelius 5, you can simply continue using your existing version with Sibelius 6. Simply create a playback configuration with one or more instances of Kontakt Player 2, and choose **Sibelius Choral** or **Sibelius World Music** as the sound set –  **4.12 Playback Devices** in Sibelius Reference for more information.

What's new?

Magnetic Layout

Sibelius already has “magnetic” slurs, accidentals, tuplets and so on, which stick to notes and repel various other objects to avoid colliding with them. Now Magnetic Layout extends this intelligent behavior to everything else in your score, to produce truly professional results without you doing anything.

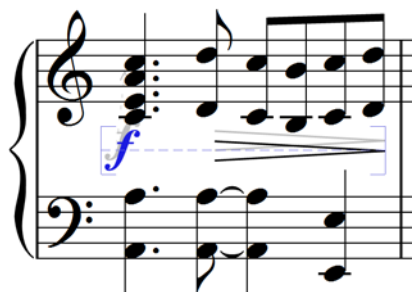

What Magnetic Layout does

In conventional music notation there exists, roughly speaking, a natural order of precedence for the proximity to the staff of different types of objects. For example, notes are always positioned on or closest to the staff, along with things that must stay with notes (e.g. accidentals, articulations, ties, rhythm dots, slurs), and related things like key signatures, time signatures and so on. Other kinds of objects then radiate outwards from the staff, with important instructions like lyrics, dynamics and playing techniques next closest to the staff, either above or below as appropriate. Above these objects come things like chord symbols, which should be aligned along the width of the system and close enough that they can be read comfortably along with the notes. Above chord symbols come system markings like tempo markings, 1st and 2nd ending lines and other repeat instructions, and rehearsal marks. Meanwhile, below the staff, text that runs across the width of the system such as figured bass and Roman numerals should sit close enough to the staff to be read comfortably, and finally pedal lines for keyboard instruments sit below that.

Magnetic Layout works by enforcing this natural order of precedence to the objects in your score. It examines all the objects attached to a staff in a given system and repositions them in the available space according to these rules in an effort to resolve all collisions, intelligently grouping together objects that should be aligned together across or down the system. It does all of this dynamically, in real time: as you input music and edit your score, Sibelius instantly moves objects to avoid collisions, and maintains legibility and clarity at all times.

For objects that have been moved by Magnetic Layout, their original position (i.e. where they would be if Magnetic Layout were switched off) is shown in gray when you select them:



As you drag objects around, you will see them snap to positions that do not collide, rather than following the mouse pointer exactly. If you want the object to follow the mouse pointer exactly, hold down **Ctrl** or **⌘** after starting to drag the item, which disables Magnetic Layout temporarily.

What Magnetic Layout doesn't do

Magnetic Layout does not change the note spacing, which determines the amount of horizontal space available, or the staff spacing, which determines the amount of vertical space between staves. This means that Sibelius can only resolve collisions between objects using the space available: it cannot itself create more space.

This means that you may occasionally encounter situations in which Sibelius is unable to resolve all collisions satisfactorily, with the result that one or more objects may appear in an unsuitable position, and will be colored red (see **Finding collisions** below). More often than not, all you need to do to help Sibelius resolve this collision is select the affected staff and the staff above or below, then choose **Layout ▶ Optimize Staff Spacing**, which will adjust the staff spacing sufficiently to resolve the collision – **8.10 Staff spacing** in Sibelius Reference.

More rarely, you may find that the best way to resolve a collision is to give Sibelius a little more horizontal space by expanding the note spacing: select the affected bars, and type **Shift+Alt+→** or **⇧⇧→** (hold Ctrl or ⌘ for larger steps) – **8.10 Staff spacing** in Sibelius Reference.

Finding collisions

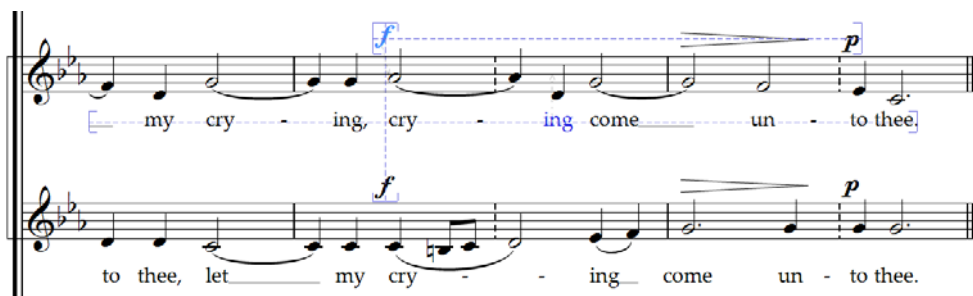
When Sibelius is unable to resolve a collision on its own, the colliding object is colored red. To find objects that collide, choose **Edit ▶ Collisions ▶ Find Next** or **Find Previous**. The next or previous colliding object will be selected and brought into view, so that you can decide how to resolve the collision (see **What Magnetic Layout doesn't do** above).

Colliding objects will only be colored red if **View ▶ Magnetic Layout Collisions** is switched on.

Grouping similar objects

Sibelius intelligently groups objects together both across the width of a system and, where appropriate, across multiple staves of the system vertically.

When you select an object that is part of a group, a light blue dashed line appears behind the object, showing you the extent of the group:



If you, say, change the pitch of a note on a vocal staff such that it would collide with the lyrics below, Sibelius will move all of the lyrics attached to that staff out of the way, subject to there being sufficient space above the staff below. It moves all the lyrics across the system together, because lyrics should always be aligned along the width of the system.

Similarly, if you add a slur below a passage of notes that would collide with a dynamic below the staff, Sibelius will move the dynamic out of the way to avoid a collision with the slur. If there are several dynamics (including both Expression text and hairpins) in close proximity, Sibelius will

move the dynamics together, so that they remain correctly aligned together as a group. Sibelius does not, however, automatically group all dynamics across the width of the entire system together: instead, it only groups nearby dynamics together, meaning that if dynamics are forced to be especially far from the staff at the start of the system (e.g. because of an unusually low note), dynamics further along the system are not necessarily positioned so far from the staff, allowing them to be positioned closer to the notes above, and making better use of the available space.

Furthermore, dynamics at the same rhythmic position on adjacent staves will also be grouped together, so if Sibelius has to move one of the dynamics left or right in order to avoid a collision, all dynamics on adjacent staves at that rhythmic position will move together. This makes it easier to spot at a glance which instruments have dynamic changes at the same position when reading the score.

The following kinds of objects will be grouped together along the width of a system:

- Bar numbers
- Lyrics
- Dynamics (Expression text and hairpins)
- Chord symbols
- 1st and 2nd ending lines
- Rehearsal marks
- Tempo marks (Tempo text, Metronome mark text, Metric modulation text, and *rit./accel.* lines)
- Figured bass
- Roman numerals
- Function symbols
- Pedal lines

The following kinds of objects are also grouped together vertically if they are found at the same rhythmic positions:

- Dynamics on adjacent staves
- Rehearsal marks
- Tempo marks

To remove an object from a group, you can either:

- Move the object so that it is no longer positioned within a space horizontally or vertically aligned with the other objects in the group; when the object leaves the group, the dashed light blue line disappears; or
- Disable collision avoidance for that specific object, which will leave the other objects in the group unaffected – see **Overriding collision avoidance** below.

In rare circumstances, you may decide that in fact you would prefer a particular kind of object not to be grouped together at all, in which case you can use **Layout ► Magnetic Layout Options** to change this – refer to Sibelius Reference for more details.

Overriding collision avoidance

You may sometimes want to override an object's Magnetic Layout position. You can still move objects that have been moved by Magnetic Layout by selecting them and dragging them with the mouse, or using the arrow keys (with **Ctrl** or **⌘** for big steps), but you may notice that the object does not go exactly where you drag or nudge it: that's because Magnetic Layout is still doing its best to move the object to a position where it doesn't collide.

You may therefore find that you want to disable Magnetic Layout for that specific object, which is done by selecting the object and choosing **Edit ▶ Magnetic Layout ▶ Off**. You can also find this menu item in the context menu that appears when you right-click (Windows) or **Control**-click (Mac) a selected object.

You can see whether Magnetic Layout is enabled or disabled for an object by looking in the **General** panel of Properties when it is selected: the **Magnetic Layout** menu will show **Default** for objects that have not been explicitly overridden (which normally means that Magnetic Layout is enabled, because only a few kinds of objects have Magnetic Layout disabled by default), **Off** for objects for which you have disabled Magnetic Layout, and **On** for objects for which you have explicitly enabled Magnetic Layout.

When you disable Magnetic Layout for an object, it is effectively ignored by Magnetic Layout thereafter, which means that other objects may collide with it.

To re-enable Magnetic Layout, select the object again and choose **Edit ▶ Magnetic Layout ▶ Default**, which removes your override. (This is preferable to choosing **On** explicitly, as it means that any changes you make to the default behavior for that type of object in **Layout ▶ Magnetic Layout Options** will apply automatically.)

Freezing Magnetic Layout positions

When Magnetic Layout is switched on, the position of each object in your score is dynamic and will change as you edit the score. You may from time to time want to tell Sibelius to fix the position of an object such that the position Magnetic Layout has chosen for them becomes its actual position.

For larger scores, this will provide an increase in editing speed, because Sibelius doesn't have to continually recalculate the Magnetic Layout positions of all objects.

To freeze positions, select an object, a passage, or even the whole score, and choose **Layout ▶ Freeze Magnetic Layout Positions**. This sets the position of the objects in the selection to their current Magnetic Layout position, then disables Magnetic Layout for those objects, so that they will not be moved again by Magnetic Layout.

If you subsequently decide you would like Magnetic Layout to take effect again, make the same selection again, then choose **Edit ▶ Magnetic Layout ▶ Default**. You may also want to choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**, to allow Sibelius free rein over the position of the objects.

Disabling Magnetic Layout altogether

If you want to disable Magnetic Layout altogether, switch off **Layout ▶ Magnetic Layout**. All objects will return to their original positions, which will introduce collisions throughout your score. For that reason, you are recommended to freeze the positions of items in your score (see above) before you switch off Magnetic Layout.

Playback

Sibelius 6 now includes more, better sounds, played back by a brand new integrated sample player, with no user set-up required. It also offers sophisticated audio software connectivity, via ReWire.

Improved Sibelius Sounds Essentials

Sibelius Sounds Essentials is the sample library that comes with Sibelius, and the updated version for Sibelius 6 includes more sounds from Garritan Personal Orchestra, Garritan Jazz and Big Band, Garritan Concert and Marching Band, Sibelius Sounds Choral and Tapspace Virtual Drumline. The result is a versatile collection of sounds well-suited for every genre of music.



Sibelius Sounds Essentials plays back through the built-in Sibelius Player, which is seamlessly integrated and needs no set-up at all. As soon as you open a score, Sibelius automatically loads the necessary sounds in the background. Depending on the number of instruments in your score, this takes anywhere from a few seconds to half a minute or so, during which time you can input and edit in your score as normal. If you try to start playback before all of the sounds have been loaded, you will see a progress bar while the remaining sounds are loaded, and playback will then begin.

Although Sibelius is set to play back through Sibelius Sounds Essentials by default, if you switch to another set of playback devices you may need to switch back, as follows:

- Choose **Play ▶ Playback Devices**
- From the **Configuration** menu at the top of the dialog, choose **Sibelius Sounds**.
- You will see **Sibelius Player** in the **Active devices** list on the right-hand side of the **Active Devices** page of the dialog. **Sound set** will be set to **Essentials**.
- Click **Close**.

For a full list of the sounds included with Sibelius 6,  **4.4 Sibelius Sounds Essentials** in Sibelius Reference.

Mixer

The Mixer contains a number of new controls. For example, for staff strips:



- Each staff strip now contains rotary controls for reverb and chorus, making it easy to adjust the level of these effects individually for each staff in the score.
- If the staff is playing back using the built-in Sibelius Player, up to six additional faders may appear, depending on the sound. These faders allow you to adjust subtle aspects of the sound, such as intonation, timbre, distortion (for guitars), tremolo speed (for vibes and electric

keyboards), and so on. To reset one of these additional faders to its default value, simply double-click it.

The virtual instrument strip likewise contains some new controls specific to the Sibelius Player:



Reverb and Chorus
(Sibelius Player only)

Sibelius Player has built-in reverb and chorus effects, and the return levels of these effects can be adjusted using the **Reverb** and **Chorus** faders that appear in Sibelius Player's own virtual instrument strip. You can control the overall level of reverb for Sibelius Player using the options in **Play ▶ Performance**, and choose between convolution reverb (sounds better) and standard stereo reverb (uses less processor power) on the **Playback** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).

Furthermore, all fader levels (including staff volume and pan, additional Sibelius Player-specific per-sound parameters, virtual instrument volume levels, and the master volume level) are now saved directly in the score, so that you can be sure that playback will sound the same every time.

For full details, see **4.3 Mixer** and **4.5 Performance** in Sibelius Reference.

Playback Devices

Sibelius creates a number of playback configurations by default, none of which can be edited by the user in **Play ▶ Playback Devices**. If you want to edit any of the default playback configurations, click **New** to create a new configuration based on the existing default one. The defaults are as follows:

- **Sibelius Sounds:** this playback configuration is chosen by default when you first run Sibelius 6. This configuration uses the built-in Sibelius Player device, and the Sibelius Sounds Essentials sample library, providing up to 128 simultaneous channels of high-quality sampled sounds. This configuration will only be created if Sibelius Sounds Essentials is correctly installed.
- **General MIDI (enhanced):** this playback configuration is chosen by default if the Sibelius Sounds configuration is not available. This configuration uses a General MIDI-compatible virtual instrument, providing up to 32 simultaneous channels of General MIDI sounds.
- **General MIDI (basic):** this playback configuration uses your computer's built-in sounds, and should only be chosen if neither Sibelius Sounds nor General MIDI (enhanced) is available for some reason. On Windows, this uses the built-in Microsoft GS Wavetable Synth, providing up to 16 channels of low-quality General MIDI sounds. On Mac, this uses the built-in DLS Music Device, providing up to 32 channels of General MIDI sounds.
- If you are upgrading from Sibelius 5 and still have the Kontakt Player 2 version of Sibelius Sounds Essentials that shipped with Sibelius 5 installed on your computer, Sibelius 6 will also create two further playback configurations, **Sibelius Essentials (16 sounds, Kontakt)** and **Sibelius Essentials (32 sounds, Kontakt)**, for backwards compatibility with the previous version. Note, however, that when you open a score last saved in Sibelius 5 using Sibelius Sounds Essentials, Sibelius 6 will use the new default Sibelius Sounds playback configuration by default rather than these Kontakt Player 2-based configurations. Kontakt Player 2 no longer comes with Sibelius 6.

For full details, see **4.12 Playback Devices** in Sibelius Reference.

ReWire

ReWire is a *virtual audio cable* that allows you to route the audio from Sibelius's playback into a Digital Audio Workstation (DAW), such as Pro Tools. It also provides you with a means to synchronize Sibelius's playback with your DAW's playback.



This opens up many possibilities for using Sibelius together with other audio software. For example, you can add an acoustic solo instrument line to your score's playback by routing the audio from Sibelius to your DAW and recording the audio there. Alternatively, you can augment a project started in your DAW with material written in Sibelius, the project in each application automatically staying in sync with the other.

The basic process of setting up a ReWire connection between Sibelius and another application is to run your sequencer or DAW first, add a stereo audio or aux channel, then load Sibelius as a multi-channel ReWire instrument. The sequencer or DAW then automatically launches Sibelius, which starts up in a special ReWire mode, whereby all audio playback is routed to the sequencer or DAW rather than to your soundcard.

When Sibelius is running in ReWire mode, the ReWire logo shown on the right appears in the blue panel at the bottom of the Playback window. (If you go to **Play ▶ Playback Devices** and click **Audio Engine Options**, you will see that the audio interface controls are disabled: this is because Sibelius is simply passing its audio on to the sequencer or DAW.)



Now when you start playback in Sibelius or your DAW, both applications will play back. To terminate the ReWire connection, quit your DAW and then quit Sibelius, or remove the ReWire track from your DAW's project window, then quit Sibelius.

For full details, see **4.16 ReWire** in Sibelius Reference.

Other playback improvements

- The playback line now moves to the next beat or the next note, whichever is the sooner.
- The playback of pauses (fermatas) has been substantially improved: repeated notes, such as trills and tremolos, now play back at the correct speed during a pause; grace notes preceding the first note following a pause now play back at the correct tempo.
- Sibelius now provides complete tempo information to virtual instruments that require it (e.g. Virtual Guitarist)
- A problem that was preventing automatic latency compensation (ALC) from working for virtual instruments has been fixed.
- Noteheads on pitched staves that trigger sound ID changes now do so at the correct rhythmic position.
- Note velocities are no longer scaled by the volume sliders in the Mixer: the Mixer's volume sliders now affect only the staff's volume (typically MIDI channel volume).

Live Tempo™

Live Tempo lets you “conduct” the playback of your score to produce a nuanced, musical performance. Simply tap a key on your computer keyboard, MIDI keyboard or foot pedal, and Sibelius follows your beat. Every detail of your interpretation is recorded, so you can play it back again later, or produce an audio or MIDI file of your performance.

And just like a real conductor, change your beating patterns at any point, and Sibelius will follow you: subdivide beats for a *rit.*, tap one in a bar in a fast passage, or stop beating entirely and Sibelius will keep going. At fermatas (pauses), Sibelius holds until your next beat, just like an orchestra.

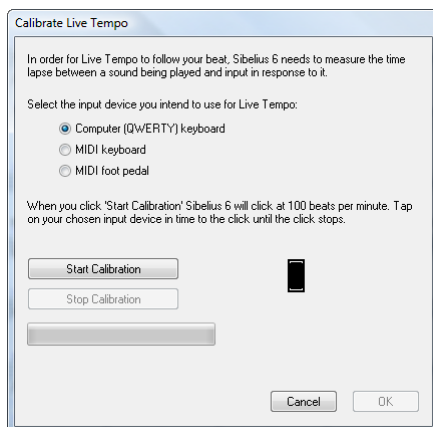

Setting up for Live Tempo recording

In order to record your performance, you need to choose your input device. Although you can freely switch between your computer keyboard, MIDI keyboard and MIDI foot pedal at any time, you are advised to choose one input device and stick to it, at least during a single Live Tempo recording.

Before you record, you should calibrate your input device, so that Sibelius can determine the latency in your computer’s playback system, and your own response speed (which is latency of a different kind!).

Open the score in which you want to record a Live Tempo performance, and choose **Play ▶ Calibrate Live Tempo**. The following dialog appears:

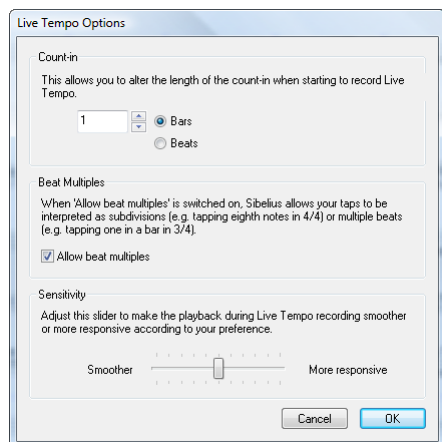


Simply choose the input device you want to calibrate from the radio buttons at the top of the dialog, then click **Start Calibration**. You will hear a click: simply tap along in time with the click, pressing any key on your computer keyboard, any key on your MIDI keyboard, or your MIDI foot pedal.

Once you have calibrated your input device, you don’t need to do it again, provided you always use the same input device and the same playback configuration (i.e. the same playback devices). If, however, you want to record Live Tempo using a different input device, or if you switch to a different playback configuration, you are advised to use **Play ▶ Calibrate Live Tempo** before recording your Live Tempo performance.

Live Tempo Options

Before you start your recording, choose **Play ▶ Live Tempo Options** to review the settings you can change to help Sibelius interpret your performance:



- **Count-in** allows you to specify how many beats you will provide to Sibelius to establish the tempo before playback begins. By default, Sibelius expects one bar's worth of beats (e.g. in 3/4, you tap three times, and on the fourth tap, Sibelius starts playing), but you can change this. If your score begins with a pick-up (upbeat) bar, the count-in includes the pick-up (e.g. if your score is in 4/4 and begins with a quarter note (crotchet) pick-up, Sibelius will begin playing on your fourth tap, assuming you have specified a one-bar count-in).
- The **Allow beat multiples** option determines whether Sibelius is allowed to interpret your taps as subdivisions (e.g. tapping eighth notes (quavers) in 4/4) or multiple beats (e.g. tapping once per bar in 3/4). This option is switched on by default.
- **Sensitivity** is the most important setting, and also the most dependent on personal taste. When the slider is set towards the left, Sibelius will follow your individual taps less closely, instead smoothing them out to establish a more consistent beat; when the slider is set towards the right, Sibelius will follow your individual taps more closely, so the tempo adjustment is more immediate.

Once you're happy with the settings, click **OK**. Now you're ready to record your performance.

Depending on factors like the number of instruments and the general range of tempos in the score, you may find that you need to visit **Live Tempo Options** a couple of times in order to try out different settings. The choices you make here are saved in the score.

Recording a Live Tempo performance

You are recommended to switch on **View ▶ Panorama** before you record Live Tempo, because there is a special Live Tempo display that only appears in Panorama – see **Live Tempo display** below.

Once you have calibrated your input device and reviewed the Live Tempo options for your score, set the playback line to the position from which you want Live Tempo recording to begin (e.g. type **Ctrl+[** or **⌘[** to move the playback line to the start of the score), then click the red Record Live Tempo button on the Playback window (shown above right) or choose **Play ▶ Record Live Tempo**.



If you haven't yet calibrated an input device, Sibelius will warn you that you may get unexpected results unless you do, and ask if you want to calibrate an input device now: you are recommended to click **Yes**, which will take you directly to the **Calibrate Live Tempo** dialog (see above).

Otherwise, the playback line will turn red, the number of beats and the beat denomination required for the count-in appears above the playback line, and Sibelius will wait for your first tap. Depending on how many beats or bars of introduction are set in **Play ▶ Live Tempo Options**, Sibelius will start playing back and following your tempo.

During Live Tempo recording, Sibelius's playback may sound a little lumpy (particularly if you have set the **Sensitivity** slider towards the right in **Live Tempo Options**). This is because it has to guess how long each beat will be in order to play back in time with your taps. When you play back your Live Tempo recording, the tempo changes will sound smoother.

If you want to stop tapping at any point but keep playback going (e.g. because you have established the tempo you want), simply stop tapping: Sibelius will keep going at the speed you have reached. When you want to join in again, simply start tapping again: Sibelius will start following you once more.

Live Tempo recording will continue until you reach the end of the score, unless your score contains multiple songs, movements or pieces, in which case it will continue until the next final barline or *Fine* marking.

If you want to stop recording Live Tempo before the end of the score, simply hit **Esc** or click the stop button in the Playback window.

Live Tempo display

You can see a graphical representation of the tempo adjustments recorded via Live Tempo by switching on **View ▶ Panorama**. When you record Live Tempo, **View ▶ Live Tempo** is switched on, showing a graph above the top staff in the score:



The vertical lines in the graph align with the barlines in the score. A horizontal line runs down the middle of the graph, which represents the default tempo at that point in the score. The variations in tempo produced by your Live Tempo recording relative to the default tempo are shown as a line that runs either above or below the horizontal line on the graph. (In the picture above, the graph shows the tempo getting faster than the regular playback tempo, then getting slower again.)

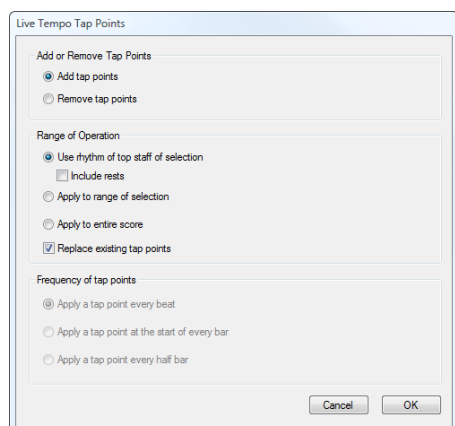
When you make a passage selection in your score, the graph reflects the selection, blocking out the sections in the graph that correspond to the selected bars. This allows you to see where Live Tempo data will be cleared if you use **Play ▶ Clear Live Tempo**.

Adding and removing tap points

By marking in the score where you are going to tap, you can employ complex conducting techniques such as melded beats (where the conductor combines two or more time-beating gestures into one long sustained gesture that has a duration equal to the combined beats).

What's new?

The quickest way to add tap points is to find the staff with the rhythm you want to tap, make a passage selection around that passage (be sure that the staff with the rhythm you want to tap is the top staff in the selection), and choose **Play ▶ Live Tempo Tap Points**, which shows this dialog:



- **Add tap points** or **Remove tap points** determines whether the options set below in the dialog will add or remove tap points from the selection or the whole score.
- The **Range of Operation** options determine in which bars tap points will be added or removed:
 - If you had a selection when you chose to open the dialog, it will default to **Use rhythm of top staff of selection**. Sibelius will create one tap point for every note on the top staff of the selection; if you switch on **Include rests**, Sibelius will create one tap point for every rest, too.
 - You can alternatively choose **Apply to range of selection**, which will add or remove tap points in the selected passage, but according to the options set in **Frequency of tap points** below, rather than using the rhythm of the top staff in the selected passage.
 - **Apply to entire score** ignores any selection in the score, and instead adds or removes tap points throughout the whole score, according to the options set in **Frequency of tap points** below.
- When adding new tap points, **Replace existing tap points** allows you to choose whether any existing tap points in the affected passage should be replaced (in which case the option should be switched on), or whether new tap points should be added without affecting existing tap points (in which case it should be switched off).
- The options in **Frequency of tap points** determine the rhythmic positions at which tap points should be added or removed if not using a rhythm from the score. You can choose whether to add or remove tap points every beat, at the start of every bar, or every half-bar.

Tap points appear on the Live Tempo display in Panorama as blobs:



You can also add tap points by clicking directly on the Live Tempo display: choose **Create ▶ Other ▶ Live Tempo Tap Point**, then click where you want to add a tap point: Sibelius draws a dashed line to help you line your tap point up with the rhythm of the music, and when you click it will snap the tap point to the nearest rhythmic position (according to the settings on the **Mouse** page of **Preferences**).

If you create tap points based on the rhythm of a passage of music and then change the rhythm of those bars, the tap points will not update automatically: you can edit or recreate the tap points using **Play ▶ Live Tempo Tap Points**.

You can also add and remove tap points simply by double-clicking on the Live Tempo display.

Recording Live Tempo using tap points

Having created some tap points, choose **Play ▶ Record Live Tempo** to record your performance. In bars containing tap points, Sibelius will expect you to tap at particular points, and it will wait for you at each tap point rather than allowing the flywheel to continue without you as it ordinarily would.

You can freely mix passages in which you provide specific tap points, and passages where Sibelius will automatically interpret your tapping: after a passage of tap points, when Sibelius encounters a full bar that contains no tap points, it will start interpreting your taps in the usual way.

Playing back a Live Tempo performance

To play back your Live Tempo performance, simply ensure that the blue **Play Live Tempo** button on the Playback window (shown on the right) or **Play ▶ Live Tempo** is switched on before you start playback.



Your Live Tempo performance is preserved when you export a MIDI or audio file, publish your score on SibeliusMusic.com, or export a Scorch web page, provided **Play ▶ Live Tempo** is switched on.

Clearing Live Tempo

To clear a whole Live Tempo performance, choose **Play ▶ Clear Live Tempo** with nothing selected, and answer **Yes** when asked if you want to remove the Live Tempo data from the entire score.

If you want to clear the tempo changes created by recording Live Tempo in a passage, simply select those bars and choose **Play ▶ Clear Live Tempo**. This removes the Live Tempo data from the selected passage. If you are in Panorama and **View ▶ Live Tempo** is switched on, you will see that the graph is cleared for those bars.

When you play back your score having cleared Live Tempo from a passage, the effect is as if you had stopped tapping for that passage during the Live Tempo recording: Sibelius will continue playing back at the same speed as was reached at the last point that has Live Tempo data, until the next Live Tempo data or the next marking in the score that changes the tempo, whichever comes first.

Subdividing the beat and multiple beats per tap

If **Allow beat multiples** is switched on in **Live Tempo Options**, Sibelius will allow you either to subdivide the beat, or to provide fewer taps in the bar than there are beats.

Pauses (fermatas)

Pauses (fermatas) can occur either in the middle of a phrase, as a point of emphasis or repose, or at the end of a phrase. A pause at the end of a phrase may sometimes be followed by a short articulatory gap, such as an upbeat, before the start of the next phrase.

By default, Sibelius plays back pauses by extending the length of the paused note, and then continues at the original tempo (unless there is a new tempo marking following the pause). When you encounter a pause during Live Tempo recording, Sibelius will extend the pause until you tap again, to signal the next beat.

You can, however, adjust the playback of notes with pauses on them, either using the **Play ▶ Dictionary** dialog, which changes the default behavior of pauses in your score, or using the controls on the **Playback** panel of Properties, which changes the behavior of an individual pause. If you specify that a pause should be followed by a gap using either of these methods, Sibelius will respect this during Live Tempo recording: you tap once to begin the pause, tap again to begin the gap following the pause, and a third time to signal the next beat.

Adding tempo markings

If you add a new Tempo text marking or metronome mark to a passage of the score for which a Live Tempo performance has been recorded, the actual playback speed of the score will not change at that point if **Play ▶ Live Tempo** is switched on: the Live Tempo performance takes precedence over the tempos marked in the score. You will, however, see that the Live Tempo graph updates to show how the recorded Live Tempo performance corresponds to the new written tempo.

To make a new tempo marking in the score take effect, you must clear the Live Tempo data – see **Clearing Live Tempo** above.

Live Tempo and ReWire

You cannot use Live Tempo and ReWire at the same time: Live Tempo is disabled when Sibelius is running in ReWire mode.

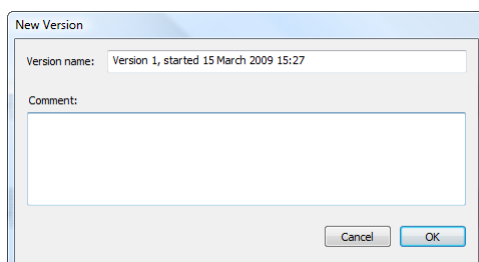
Versions

The new versions feature keeps track of revisions to your score, lets you look back at earlier versions of it, and see what changes were made since. This is invaluable for all kinds of people: students can record their progress as they write coursework, and quickly generate a commentary (that can be edited in Microsoft Word or another word processor) for submitting along with their final piece; teachers can track what each student has done since last week; composers and arrangers can look back at earlier revisions, or see changes made by orchestrators, publishers and other collaborators.

Saving a new version automatically

By default, Sibelius will remind you to create a new version when you close a score after you've been editing it for a while. By default, you will see the following dialog:



You can change the provided **Version name** to anything you like: the name Sibelius provides for you includes a version number, and the date and time at which the version was started. You can also provide a **Comment**, which can be as short or as long as you like.

Click **OK** to save your version, and close the score; if you click **Cancel**, you will nevertheless be offered the chance to save your score without creating a new version.

If you would prefer not to be prompted to create a version when closing your score, switch off **Create a new version when closing the score** on the **Versions** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).

Saving a new version manually

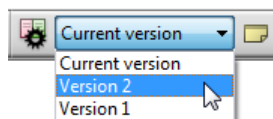
You can, of course, save a new version at any time: simply choose **File ▶ Save Version**, or click the toolbar button shown on the right. The button is only enabled once you have saved your score once and given it a filename. When you save a new version, you will be prompted to provide a name and, by default, a comment (see above). If you would prefer not to have to provide a comment, choose **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac) and go to the **Versions** page.



If you are teaching with Sibelius in the classroom, you can prompt one or more of the students in your classroom to save a new version at any time using the **Classroom Control** dialog – see **Classroom Control** below.

Viewing versions

You can view the versions saved in your score using the drop-down on the toolbar shown on the right. (If these controls don't appear on your toolbar, your computer's screen resolution is too low – see **Toolbar** on page 476.)



The current version of your score is always called **Current version**, and always appears at the top of the list in the menu: the oldest version is listed at the bottom, and the most recent version just underneath **Current version**.

When you choose another version from the list, or choose another version from the **File ▶ Versions** submenu, Sibelius opens a new window, and gives the score a crumpled paper background, to remind you that it's an old version.

What you can do with versions

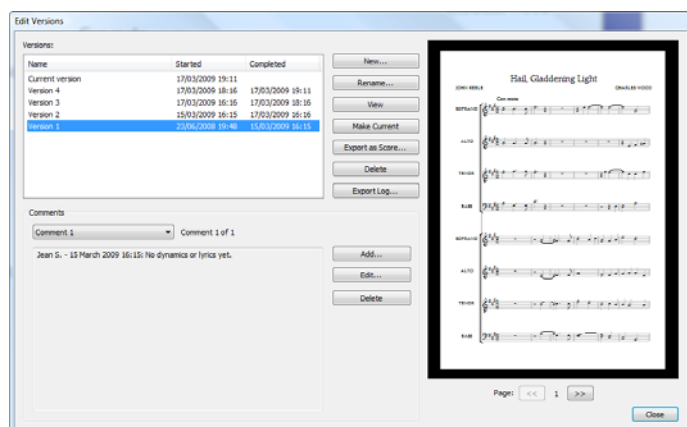
Only the current version of your score is editable, so once you have made a version, you can no longer make any changes to that older version. When you view a version, however, you can do lots of useful things, including play it back, print it out, or even copy music and objects to the clipboard so that you can paste them into your current version, or even another score.

To copy from an old version, simply make a selection as you would in any other score, then choose **Edit ▶ Copy** (shortcut **Ctrl+C** or **⌘C**) to copy to the clipboard. Then switch to the current version or the other score into which you want to paste the material, and choose **Edit ▶ Paste** (shortcut **Ctrl+V** or **⌘V**). You cannot use **Alt+click** (or chord-click) to copy from an old version.

You can also compare one version with another version – see **Comparing versions** below.

Edit Versions

You can perform a number of important file management tasks on the versions in your score using the **File ▶ Versions ▶ Edit Versions** dialog, which you can also open using the toolbar button shown on the right.



The table at the left-hand side of the dialog lists the versions in the score. You can choose to sort by the **Name**, the date the version was **Started**, or the date the version was **Completed**. On the right is a preview that shows the selected version. You can flip through the pages of the selected version using the buttons below the preview.

Below the table is a list of all the comments saved in the selected version, including any “sticky note” comments, and any comments provided when the version was created. You can **Add**, **Edit** and **Delete** comments here by clicking the appropriate button.

The buttons between the table of versions and the preview of the selected version are as follows:

- **New** creates a new version, i.e. equivalent to choosing **File ▶ Save Version**.
- **Rename** renames the selected version.
- **View** closes the **Edit Versions** dialog and opens a window to view the selected version.
- **Make Current** allows you to make a selected version into the current version. A new version is automatically created to save the state of the current version, and the selected version is then made into the new current version.
- **Export as Score** exports the selected version as a separate score, containing only that single version. You can select **Current version** and click **Export as Score** to make a copy of the current state of your score quickly without including any of the older versions.
- **Delete** deletes the selected version, after a warning.
- **Export Log** exports a Rich Text Format (RTF) file listing the differences between each version, all their associated comments, and a graphic of each page– see **Exporting a versions log** below.

Click **Close** to close the **Edit Versions** dialog.

Exporting a versions log

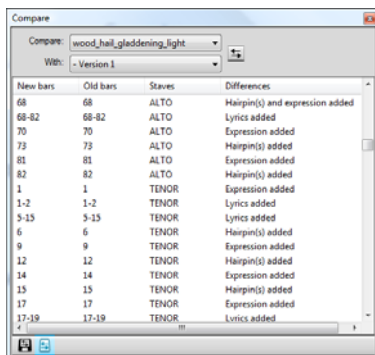
Sibelius can export a Rich Text Format (RTF) file that includes a list of the differences between each pair of versions, all comments saved in each version, and a thumbnail graphic of each page of each version, with the differences between them colored in.

This file can be opened in any word processor and many text editors, though the thumbnail graphics of each page may only appear in certain versions of certain word processors, e.g. Microsoft Word 2002 or later for Windows, and Microsoft Word 2008 or later for Mac OS X – for more information, refer to Sibelius Reference.

Comparing versions

Sibelius provides a simple way to compare two versions of the same score, and see the differences between them both as a tabulated list, and visually displayed in the scores themselves.

To compare two versions, choose **Window ▶ Compare** (shortcut **Ctrl+Alt+C** or **⌘+⌘C**), or click the toolbar button shown on the right. This window appears:



What's new?

Choose the newer of the two versions from the first list, labeled **Compare**, and the older of the two versions from the second list, labeled **With**, then click the  button.

A progress bar appears as the two versions are compared; after a few seconds, the older of the two versions is shown in a window on the left, and the newer version is shown in a window on the right, tiled vertically. If you would prefer Sibelius not to tile the two windows vertically, go to the **Versions** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the **Sibelius** menu on Mac) and switch off **Tile windows when comparing versions**.

A window then appears titled **Summary of Differences**. This gives you a high-level overview of the changes between two versions: for example, you may see a line like “Lyrics added to 82 bars”, or “Expression added to 40 bars”. Click **Close** to dismiss this window. If you would prefer not to see this, switch off **Show simple summary of differences in Preferences**.

The Compare window shows a detailed list of all of the differences between the two versions. Sibelius takes account of whether objects have been added, changed or deleted, as follows:

- Objects that have been added in the newer version are shown with a green background in the newer version.
- Objects that have been changed in the newer version are shown with an orange background in both the older and the newer version.
- Objects that have been deleted in the newer version are shown with a red background in the older version.



If you don't want to see the differences visually in the score, either switch off **View ▶ Differences Between Versions**, or click the button in the toolbar at the bottom of the Compare window shown on the right .

What Sibelius compares

Sibelius does not keep track of every single edit made to your score between versions: rather, it looks at the two versions and does its best to work out the changes that were made between them. Because of this heuristic approach, there may be more than one way to characterise a particular difference between two versions.

Sibelius does not notice differences in layout, formatting, note spacing or document setup: it is concerned only with the musical content of the compared scores, and not their appearance.

For a full list of the things Sibelius considers when comparing versions, see [Sibelius Reference](#).

Comparing two separate scores

The Compare window can also be used to compare two separate scores. Simply open the two scores that you want to compare, choose the newer of the two scores from the **Compare** drop-down and the older of the two from the **With** drop-down, and click the  button.

Comments

Comments are like sticky notes you can add to your score. Just like the real thing, you can use them to write reminders to yourself, or to communicate with someone else you'll be sending your score to. To create a comment, simply click the new toolbar button or choose **Create ▶ Comment** (shortcut **Shift+Alt+C** or **⌘+⌘C**), then type: Sibelius automatically includes your name, the date and the time. If you add a comment to a selected passage, it will also include the instrument(s) and bars referred to.

You can change the appearance of comments using the new options on the **Other** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the **Sibelius** menu on Mac), and comments written by different people are automatically color-coded – ideal if you're sharing a score with a student, teacher, arranger or editor.

Minimize and maximize individual comments by double-clicking their title bars, or hide all the comments in your score altogether by switching off **View ▶ Comments**.

Classroom Control

If you are running a multi-user copy of Sibelius 6 with the Sibelius Licence Server, you can use the new **File ▶ Classroom Control** dialog to perform simple classroom management tasks.

First, define a password in the Licence Server Control Panel, then use it to verify your identity to the Classroom Control feature. You can then see a list of all the copies of Sibelius running in the lab, and the username of the student at each workstation. From your own workstation, you can “freeze” the copies of Sibelius running in the classroom when you want the students to pay attention, retrieve the file that each student is working on (saving each file in a folder named after the student's user name), push a file from your own workstation to any or all of the students' workstations, and make Sibelius create a new version of the student's score using the new Versions feature, to help you track their progress over time.

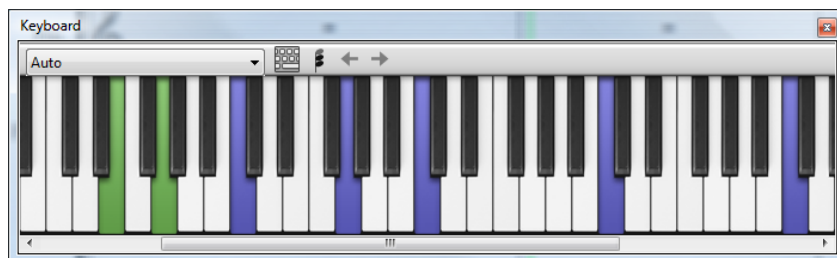

Keyboard and Fretboard windows

The beautiful new Keyboard and Fretboard windows are ideal for anyone who prefers using a keyboard or guitar than using a staff to notate music. Simply click on the keys or frets to input notes and chords – or “play” your computer’s QWERTY keys just like a piano.

Keyboard window

To show or hide the Keyboard window, click the toolbar button shown on the right, or choose **Window ▶ Keyboard** (shortcut **Ctrl+Alt+B** or **⌘+⌥+B**):



The Keyboard window has three sizes (the middle of which is shown above), and it is resized by grabbing its bottom edge (or its top edge, on Windows) and dragging. You can also change the width of the Keyboard window by dragging its left or right edge (Windows) or bottom right-hand corner (Mac).

To input notes using the mouse by clicking on the Keyboard window, simply select the point in the score where you want to start inputting notes, and then click the note on the Keyboard window you want to input. If you click on a black note and you want to change the enharmonic spelling, simply hit **Return** (on the main keyboard) immediately after inputting the note.

The note input caret advances automatically after you input each note, so if you want to input a chord, click the chord mode button on the Keyboard window’s toolbar, shown on the right. Now each note you click is added to the current chord, and to advance the caret you must click the right arrow button to the right of the chord mode button.



You can also input notes via the Keyboard window using your computer’s keyboard. Normally when inputting notes using your computer’s keyboard, you would type the name of the note you want to input (e.g. C for C, G for G, and so on). When using the Keyboard window, by contrast, you use a different set of keys, arranged roughly in the shape of an octave of keys on a piano keyboard. This is called *QWERTY mode*, so named for the top row of keys on an English keyboard.

Because most of the keys on your computer’s keyboard are already set to do something (e.g. T for **Create ▶ Time Signature**, Y for **Create ▶ Clef** and so on), you must tell Sibelius that you want to override these regular shortcuts in order to use QWERTY mode, which you do by clicking the button on the Keyboard window’s toolbar, shown above right, or type the shortcut **Shift+Alt+Q** or **⇧+⌥+Q**.



A corresponds to C, W to C# or Db, S to D, E to D# or Eb, and so on, right up to K, which corresponds to C an octave above. Z hops down an octave, and X hops up an octave. It may help to remember that G inputs a G, F inputs an F, and E inputs an Eb.

To input a chord in QWERTY mode, simply press two or three keys together. Depending on your computer keyboard, you may not be able to input chords of four or more notes simultaneously.

Fretboard window

To show or hide the Fretboard window, click the toolbar button shown on the right, or choose **Window ▶ Fretboard** (shortcut **Ctrl+Alt+E** or **⌘+⌥+E**):



Using the menu at the right-hand end of the Fretboard's toolbar, you can choose between maple, rosewood and acoustic 6-string guitar fretboards, or maple and rosewood 4-string bass guitar fretboards, or a rosewood 5-string bass guitar fretboard.

The Fretboard window has three sizes (the middle of which is shown above), and it is resized by grabbing its bottom edge (or its top edge, on Windows) and dragging.

To input notes using the Fretboard window, simply select the bar or rest from which you want to start inputting. Sibelius will automatically choose the most appropriate kind of Fretboard based on the kind of instrument you have selected. Now click at the fret position on the appropriate string for the note you want to input.

The note input caret advances automatically after you input each note, so if you want to input a chord, click the chord mode button on the Fretboard window's toolbar, shown on the right. Now each fret position you click is added to the current chord, and to advance the caret you must click the right arrow button to the right of the chord mode button.



Aside from inputting notes, the other thing the Fretboard window can do is show you which notes are played during playback. You can choose which instrument to follow using the menu at the left-hand side of the Fretboard window's toolbar.

By default, it's set to **Auto**, which means that it will follow the topmost guitar or bass staff in the score, or failing that the topmost staff in the score, unless you have selected one or more staves before starting playback, in which case it will follow only the topmost of those staves. If you always want to follow a particular staff during playback, choose the name of the staff from the menu at the left-hand side of the Fretboard window's toolbar.

Notice that the Fretboard window can only follow notes in voice 1 during playback; other voices are simply omitted. If a note is too high to be displayed on the current fretboard, it is shown by an arrow pointing rightwards at the top of the highest string; similarly, if a note is too low to be displayed on the current fretboard, it is shown as an arrow pointing leftwards at the bottom of the lowest string. The Fretboard window can also follow the chord symbols in the score, showing how they can be fingered on guitar; simply choose **Chord symbols** from the menu on the Fretboard's toolbar.

Chord symbols

Chord symbols can now appear as a text chord symbol, a guitar chord diagram (in a choice of voicings), or as both together: they're all now treated as the same kind of object.

Regardless of whether you want either or both the chord text and the chord diagram to appear, any chord symbol can be input in one of two ways: by typing it into the score, or by playing it on a MIDI keyboard (or MIDI guitar).

For full details, see [2.10 Chord symbols](#) and [8.13 Edit Chord Symbols](#) in Sibelius Reference.

Overview of creating chord symbols

- Select the note or rest on the staff above which you want to add chord symbols, and choose **Create ▸ Chord Symbol** (shortcut **Ctrl+K** or **⌘K**, for “kord”).
- A flashing cursor appears above the staff. Now either:
 - type the desired chord symbol, e.g. “Cmaj7” – see **Creating chord symbols by typing** below; or
 - play the chord on your MIDI keyboard in any voicing – see **Creating chord symbols by playing** below.
- Hit **Space** to advance the cursor to the next note or beat position (if you input a chord symbol via your MIDI keyboard, the cursor advances automatically); hit **Tab** to advance the cursor to the start of the next bar.
- If you make a mistake, hit **Backspace** to edit the previous chord symbol, or type **Shift-Tab** to jump back to the beginning of the previous bar.

Overview of editing chord symbols

You can edit chord symbols both globally and on an individual basis. Global edits include things like choosing how you want all chords with major 7ths in to appear, or whether you want guitar chord diagrams to appear on all staves or only on guitar notation staves, and so on. These settings are changed on the **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▸ Engraving Rules**, and in **House Style ▸ Edit Chord Symbols**, and are discussed in detail in [8.13 Edit Chord Symbols](#) in Sibelius Reference.

Individual edits affect only the selected chord symbol:

- To edit an existing chord symbol, select it and hit **Return** (on the main keyboard) or double-click it.
- To enharmonically respell a chord symbol entered from the MIDI keyboard, e.g. a chord symbol based on F# that should be based on Gb, select the chord symbol, and choose **Edit ▸ Chord Symbol ▸ Respell Chord Symbol**, which is also available in the context menu when you right-click (Windows) or **Control-click** (Mac) with a chord symbol selected.
- To make a chord diagram appear or disappear for a single chord symbol, select it and choose **Edit ▸ Chord Symbol ▸ Add/Remove Chord Diagram**.
- To make chord text appear or disappear for a single chord symbol, select it and choose **Edit ▸ Chord Symbol ▸ Add/Remove Chord Text**.

- To cycle between equivalent text chord symbol types (e.g. Cm^{7(b5)} and C^{ø7}), select the chord symbol and choose **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol ▶ Equivalent Chord Text**.
- To cycle between alternative voicings for the guitar chord diagram, select the chord symbol and choose **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol ▶ Revoice Chord Diagram**.

Creating chord symbols by typing

To type in chord symbols using the computer keyboard, you don't need to know how to type any special symbols, such as Ø for half-diminished, or Δ for major (or major 7th): simply start by using the keyboard shortcut **Ctrl+K** or **⌘K**, then type in a plain English version of the chord you want, and Sibelius will create any special symbols automatically as required, and following the preferences you have set on the **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** and in **House Style ▶ Edit Chord Symbols**.

To type a root note, simply type its name, e.g. "C#" or "Bb." If you want to type an altered bass note, type a slash followed by the note name, e.g. "/E."

The different elements following the root note that make up more complex chord symbols are called *suffix elements*, and Sibelius understands a specific list of suffix elements that you can type from your keyboard, as follows:

halfdim	dim11	sus2	13	9
add6/9	maj9	add2	11	7
sus2/4	add9	maj	#9	6
omit5	maj7	dim	b9	5
omit3	dim9	6/9	b6	4
maj13	dim7	aug	#5	2
add13	sus9	alt	b5	m
maj11	sus4	b13	#4	/
dim13	add4	#11	nc	%

The list above is largely self-explanatory, except perhaps for "nc," which means "no chord" and produces the chord symbol N.C., "/", which is normally used to precede an altered bass note, but when typed on its own produces a rhythm slash (↗), and "%", which produces a repeat bar symbol (↻).

Using the above suffix elements, you can quickly type very complex chord symbols just as you would expect (try typing "Cmaj7b13b9b5"). You don't need to include any parentheses or other separators in your text, or type the suffix elements in any particular order (though note that the order you type them in is disregarded when it comes to displaying the actual chord symbol: Sibelius always displays alterations in descending order by default).

To navigate around while inputting chord symbols, **Space** moves on to the next note or beat (whichever comes first), **Tab** moves to the start of the next bar, **Backspace** moves to the previous chord symbol, and **Shift-Tab** moves to the start of the previous bar.

Creating chord symbols by playing

To input chord symbols by playing them in, start chord symbol input with the keyboard shortcut **Ctrl+K** or **⌘K**, and when you see the flashing text cursor, simply play the chord you want to input on your MIDI keyboard; the flashing cursor automatically advances to the next note or beat.

By default, Sibelius uses the voicing of the chord that you play to determine not only the chord type, but also the specific way in which the chord is notated, e.g. if you play the chord in one of its inversions, Sibelius will produce a chord symbol with an altered bass note, e.g. **D/F#**.

Sibelius will normally produce the desired enharmonic spelling for the root note (and altered bass note, if present) based on the current key signature, but should you decide that you want to respell the chord symbol after input, this is simple – see **Respell Chord Symbol** below.

If you should happen to play a chord that Sibelius doesn't recognise, Sibelius will write the names of the notes you played in red and advance the caret. You should go back and fix up this erroneous chord symbol later on!

If you want to define your own specific MIDI input voicing for a particular chord type, e.g. to make it quicker to input a common chord type, you can do so in **House Style ▶ Edit Chord Symbols**.

Navigating around while inputting chord symbols via MIDI keyboard is the same as while inputting them using the computer keyboard – see **Creating chord symbols by typing** above.

Editing an existing chord symbol

To edit a chord symbol, simply double-click it, or select it and hit **Return** (on the main keyboard). You can then either delete the existing text in order to type a new chord symbol, or simply play a new chord on your MIDI keyboard to replace it.

Other kinds of edits to chord symbols can be done simply by selecting one or more chord symbols, then choosing the desired operation from the **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol** submenu, which is also available when you right-click (Windows) or **Control-click** (Mac) a chord symbol.

Equivalent Chord Text

There are often several different ways to represent the same pattern of intervals in a chord symbol. Sibelius makes it easy to cycle between the different possibilities, which is useful if you have played in a chord symbol and found that Sibelius has not automatically chosen the type that you prefer.

Simply select the chord symbol (or chord symbols) whose chord text you want to change, then choose **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol ▶ Equivalent Chord Text** (shortcut **Ctrl+Shift+K** or **⌘⇧K**); each time you choose it, Sibelius chooses the next equivalent chord text, eventually cycling back around to the original chord appearance.

Revoice Chord Diagram

There are always many alternative ways to play a given chord type on a guitar. Each chord type has a preferred chord diagram associated with it (which you can edit in **House Style ▶ Edit Chord Symbols**), which is the chord diagram that is shown by default for that chord type.

To choose another guitar chord diagram, select the chord symbol (or chord symbols), then choose **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol ▶ Revoice Chord Diagram** (shortcut **Ctrl+Shift+Alt+K** or **⌘⇧⌘K**); each time you choose it, Sibelius chooses the next voicing it can find.

Respell Chord Symbol

After having input a chord symbol via your MIDI keyboard, you may want to change the enharmonic spelling of its root note, altered bass note, or both. To do this, select the chord symbol (or chord symbols), then choose **Edit ▶ Chord Symbol ▶ Respell Chord Symbol**; each time you choose it, Sibelius respells the chord.

All valid spellings for a root note are considered, so C will change to B $\sharp$ and D $\flat$ before arriving back at C. Altered bass notes will never be spelled using double accidentals unless the chord's root note is also spelled using a double accidental.

Choosing when chord diagrams should appear

By default, Sibelius will show only chord text on all instruments except for notation staves (as opposed to tab staves) belonging to guitars and other fretted instruments. When a chord symbol is attached to a notation staff, Sibelius determines the appearance of the chord diagram according to the implied tuning of that guitar or other fretted instrument; if the instrument is neither a guitar nor another kind of fretted instrument, when Sibelius shows a guitar chord diagram, it is for a 6-string guitar set to the standard tuning.

You can change this using the options on the **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** – refer to Sibelius Reference for more information.

Engraving Rules options

The **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** contains a dizzying array of options, allowing you to control many aspects of the default appearance of the chord symbols in your score. For full details, refer to Sibelius Reference.

You can override the global choices made on the **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** for individual chord types using **House Style ▶ Edit Chord Symbols** –  **8.13 Edit Chord Symbols** in Sibelius Reference.

Legacy chord symbol input

In earlier versions of Sibelius, chord symbols were a kind of text, and had to be typed in using special keyboard shortcuts or bits of chord symbol chosen from a word menu. For the purposes of backwards compatibility, it is possible to enable so-called *legacy chord symbol input*, which makes chord symbols behave the same way as in earlier versions, by switching on the **Use legacy chord symbol input** checkbox on the **Other** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).

Be aware that legacy chord symbols do not respond to the edits possible from the **Edit ▶ Chord Symbols** submenu, and do not change appearance when you change the options on the **Chord Symbols** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**. As a consequence, you are strongly recommended to use real chord symbols.

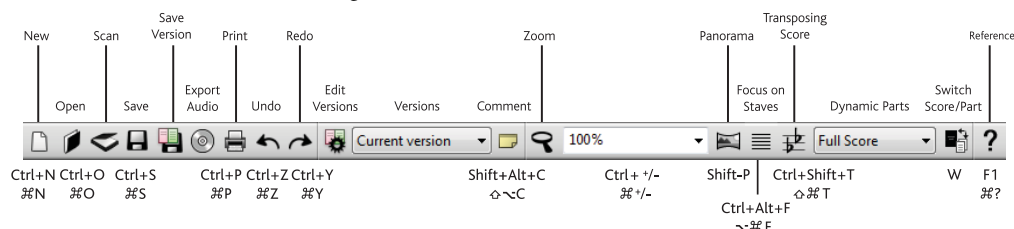
If you find yourself occasionally needing a legacy chord symbol, you can choose **Create ▶ Text ▶ Special Text ▶ Chord symbol** to type a single legacy chord symbol into the score. If you want, you can also assign a keyboard shortcut to the **Chord symbols** text style, and use that shortcut on the occasions when you require a legacy chord symbols.

Look and feel

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 5 or Sibelius 4, the look and feel of Sibelius 6 will be familiar, with only minor changes, allowing you to get back to work right away. If you are upgrading from an earlier version of Sibelius, there will be a few more changes to get used to, all of which will make working with the software quicker and more comfortable.

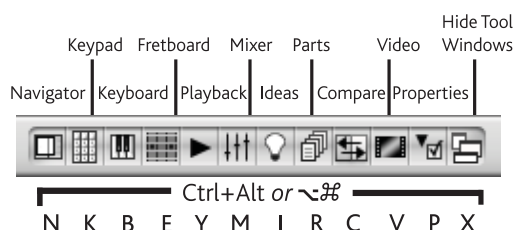
Toolbar

The toolbar now has the following controls:



The only new buttons added since Sibelius 5 are for versions and comments (see **Versions** on page 35), between **Save** and **Export Audio**, and just to the left of the zoom button.

The group of buttons at the far right-hand side of the toolbar hide and show Sibelius's 11 floating tool windows, as follows:



The three new floating windows added in Sibelius 6 are discussed in **Keyboard and Fretboard windows** on page 40 and **Versions** on page 35.

If the width of your display is not sufficiently wide for Sibelius to be able to fit in all of the toolbar buttons (1280 x 1024 is the minimum recommended resolution for Sibelius 6), it will automatically hide some of them for you. To control which buttons are hidden and shown, use the options on the **Display** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac) – **5.23 View menu** in Sibelius Reference.

Menus

Various menu items have been renamed slightly or moved to other menus. The most important change since Sibelius 5 is that **Create ▶ Chord Diagram** and **Create ▶ Text ▶ Chord Symbol** have been replaced by a single menu item, **Create ▶ Chord Symbol**, which has many benefits – see **Chord symbols** on page 42.

There are a couple of other minor menu changes detailed in **Appendix B: Menu changes** on page 88, which also includes changes to menus from earlier versions of Sibelius.

Keyboard shortcuts

We have added a number of new keyboard shortcuts and changed a handful as well. The most important change is that the first Keypad layout is now on **F7**, not **F8**, because the Keypad now has six layouts rather than five. Full details are in **Appendix C: Keyboard shortcuts** on page 89.

Note input

There are no significant changes to note input in Sibelius 6, other than the changes to the keyboard shortcuts for the Keypad.

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 4 or earlier, you may want to know that if you select a passage before you create a clef, time signature or key signature, Sibelius will automatically restore the original clef, time signature or key signature at the end of the selected passage. It will do this regardless of the length of the passage, so if you typically click in an empty part of a bar (which makes a passage selection of one bar) before you create one of these objects, Sibelius will now automatically restore the original object at the end of the bar, which may not be what you want. If you want to disable the creation of restorative objects at the end of selections of one bar or shorter in length, switch off **Restore original item after single-bar selection** on the **Note Input** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).

If you are upgrading from Sibelius 2 or 3, there is one further significant change, introduced in Sibelius 4, that you need to know about: **space** is no longer used for inputting rests. Instead, the **0** key on the numeric keypad is used for inputting rests. This also means:

- In previous versions, hitting **0** on the numeric keypad with one or more notes or rests selected would toggle the selection between notes and rests.
- In previous versions, hitting **space** with a note selected would show the note input caret *after* the selected note, allowing you to continue note input from that point.
- If you are using a notebook (laptop) computer and therefore do not have a numeric keypad on your keyboard, we recommend choosing the **Notebook (laptop) features** feature set on the **Menus and Shortcuts** page of **File ▶ Preferences**, which assigns the numeric keypad functions to the row of number keys on the main keyboard (Windows only).

For details of how to make Sibelius 6 behave as closely as possible to Sibelius 3 or Sibelius 2 with regard to note input shortcuts, see <http://www.sibelius.com/helpcenter/en/a481>. But, of course, we don't recommend this: if at all possible you should learn the new note input shortcuts.

For more on customizing keyboard shortcuts, see **5.12 Menus and shortcuts** in Reference.

Windows-specific improvements

- Sibelius is now a Large Address Aware (LAA) application. This means that if your computer has more than 2GB RAM installed, Sibelius can access more of your computer's memory, under certain circumstances:
 - If you are running 32-bit Windows XP, and have enabled the **/3GB** switch in **boot.ini** (see <http://tinyurl.com/winxpmem>), Sibelius can access up to 3GB RAM.
 - If you are running 64-bit Windows XP/Vista/7, Sibelius can now access up to 4GB RAM.

Accessing more than 2GB RAM is useful for playback of large scores with many staves, allowing your computer to run more channels of sounds simultaneously.

What's new?

- The **File ▶ Open** dialog now defaults to the **All Music Files** file type filter (for Sibelius scores, MIDI files, PhotoScore files, and MusicXML files) on Windows, as well as on Mac.
- Tabbed dialogs (including **Edit Text Style**, **Play ▶ Dictionary**, **Edit Staff Type**, **Transform Live Playback**, **Score Info**) now correctly respond to tabbing through the controls and the use of **Alt+letter** mnemonics.
- It is no longer possible to click buttons etc. on Sibelius's floating tool windows when a modal dialog is showing.
- The file creation and modification dates on the **File** tab of **File ▶ Score Info** now show the date and time in local time, not GMT.
- If you have a landscape score set to **Fit page** zoom level with **View ▶ Scroll Bars** switched on, you can now scroll correctly (this bug only affected the normal Windows XP theme, and only at 1280 x 1024 screen resolution).
- Tooltips now continue to appear after clicking a button.
- Any error dialog that may appear while Sibelius's splash screen is visible no longer appears behind the splash screen, making it impossible to dismiss (Windows Vista only).
- The accuracy of scroll bar positioning is now improved.

Mac-specific improvements

- Sibelius now uses Cocoa mouse pointers, and Cocoa alert windows and message boxes (e.g. for OK message boxes, **Yes/No** dialogs, etc.).
- You can now once more use the arrow keys to move up and down the menus in Sibelius.
- Spin controls (e.g. for text point size in the **Text** panel of **Properties**) now correctly automatically increment and decrement when you keep the mouse button depressed on one of the arrows.
- You can now always activate the dialog control that has focus (e.g. a combo box or button) by hitting **Space**.
- Hitting **Return** to move to the next page of the **File ▶ New** dialog no longer skips several pages.
- Hitting **Esc** to cancel the **Beam and Rest Groups** dialog in **Create ▶ Time Signature** no longer causes the dialog to re-open again instantly.
- The speed of scrolling through the score using the mouse wheel now reflects the setting of the **Scrolling** slider on the **Mouse** page of **Keyboard & Mouse** in System Preferences.
- You can now arrow up and down the list of pages in multi-page dialogs (e.g. **Preferences**, **Engraving Rules**) without the focus being stolen by one of the pages.
- Hitting **Return** to return the focus to the score window after typing a zoom level into the combo box on Sibelius's toolbar now works correctly if you type one of the preset zoom levels.
- If you click on the zoom combo box on the toolbar while a sheet-based dialog (e.g. **Page Setup**) is active, Sibelius no longer crashes.
- When moving the score up or down by clicking and dragging on the paper, the score no longer accelerates out of view when the mouse pointer moves over the edge of the score window.
- It is no longer possible to drag a score window behind the toolbar on computers with two displays.
- If you launch Sibelius by double-clicking a score icon, the title bar of the score's window no longer opens underneath Sibelius's toolbar.

- If you switch Sibelius's toolbar on or off via **View ▶ Toolbar**, any open score windows are repositioned such that they do not end up behind the toolbar.
- If you open a Sibelius score on your second display and maximize it, then drag it right up to the top of the display, the score now appears on the screen correctly when it is next re-opened.
- The performance of Quick Look preview for Sibelius scores on Mac OS X 10.5 and later has been improved. Scores now appear more quickly, and the Quick Look window is now correctly resized to match the aspect ratio of each score being previewed.
- When **Restore score window sizes and positions** is switched on (on the **Files** page of **Preferences**), if you open one score and maximize it, further scores that you open are no longer incorrectly also opened maximized (unless they were previously saved maximized).

Other improvements

- The threshold for moving an item is now scaled according to zoom level, so a drag threshold of 1.5 spaces at 100% no longer requires you to move the mouse a very long way at high zoom levels like 800% before the item moves.
- Handles (on barlines, slurs, stems, etc.) now scale along with the zoom level, making them easier to select at high zoom levels.
- Sibelius no longer repaginates the score more often than it needs to, providing an increase in the speed of various editing operations.
- A number of input and editing operations are considerably faster than in previous versions of Sibelius, particularly for large selections, including **Layout ▶ Reset Note Spacing**, toggling **Notes ▶ Transposing Score**, transposing selections using the up and down arrow keys, moving guitar tab notes between strings, changing the voice of notes using the Keypad, adding or removing accidentals using the Keypad, and cycling through notehead types using **Shift+Alt++/-** or **⇧⇧⇧++/-**.
- The **About Sibelius** window now has a scrolling display of the names of the people behind Sibelius, and the window can now be dismissed by hitting **Esc** or **Return** (on the main keyboard) as well as clicking it with the mouse.

Features no longer included with Sibelius 6

A small number of features that were included in earlier versions have been removed from Sibelius 6:

- **View ▶ Note Colors ▶ Pitch Spectrum** has been removed.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Composing Tools ▶ Realize Figured Bass** has been removed.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Accidentals ▶ Add Cautionary Accidentals** has been removed; this plug-in is superseded by the new automatic cautionary accidentals features in Sibelius 6.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Notes and Rests ▶ Add Slash Noteheads For Parts** has been removed; this plug-in has been superseded by the improvements to the behavior of slash noteheads in Sibelius 6.

In addition, Sibelius 6 can no longer import Acorn Sibelius files, SCORE files or Finale files, and can neither import nor export ASCII tab files. Where possible, you should use another application to convert files in these formats to MusicXML files, and then import them into Sibelius 6 via MusicXML. However, if you cannot convert these files to MusicXML, you are advised to use your previous version of Sibelius to import them, save them as a Sibelius score, and then open the resulting Sibelius score in Sibelius 6.

Other improvements and fixes

The other new features and improvements in Sibelius 6 are summarized below in the order in which they appear in Sibelius Reference. For more details, refer to the appropriate Sibelius Reference topic, either in the new printed book (if you have purchased one) or on-screen by choosing **Help ▶ Documentation ▶ Sibelius Reference** (shortcut **F1** or **⌘?**).

1.1 Note input

- **Edit ▶ Repeat** (shortcut **R**) now always correctly uses the note value from the Keypad and the pitch of the previous note. This means that if you repeat a note that is longer than the remaining duration of the bar, Sibelius will now create a tied note into the next bar. If you would prefer Sibelius to continue to truncate the note at the barline instead, as it did in earlier versions, switch on **Truncate notes at end of bars when using Edit ▶ Repeat** on the **Note Input** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).
- When auditioning a sound using your MIDI keyboard after having selected a staff in the score, the correct sound is now used if you make a selection following an instrument change.

1.2 Keypad

- The Keypad now has six layouts: a new **Jazz articulations** layout has been added between the old fourth (**Articulations**) and fifth (**Accidentals**) layouts. The new layout includes 1-bar, 2-bar and 4-bar repeats (see **2.27 Repeat bars** below), note-attached arpeggio lines (see **2.2 Arpeggios** below), and scoops, falls and doits for jazz (see **2.19 Jazz articulations** below). Because of this, the keyboard shortcut for the first Keypad layout is now **F7**, not **F8**.
- The blank spot at the top left-hand corner of the Keypad (corresponding visually to the **Num Lock** key on most keyboards) now contains a mouse pointer icon. Clicking on this icon is equivalent to hitting **Esc**, and therefore makes it possible to clear the current selection or leave note input using only the mouse (i.e. without physically hitting the **Esc** key). This is particularly useful if you are using Sibelius on an interactive whiteboard in a classroom setting.
- The Keypad now shows tooltips when you hover the mouse over its buttons (Mac only).

1.5 Scanning

- PhotoScore Lite 6 can now read simple tuplets.
- **File ▶ Scan** has been renamed as **File ▶ Scan with PhotoScore**. The **Open PhotoScore File** dialog has been renamed as **Open PhotoScore or AudioScore File**.
- Key signatures in scores created by importing from PhotoScore and AudioScore are now correctly created for the entire system, so that any new instruments added to the score after import will inherit the existing key signature.

1.6 Audio input

Sibelius 6 now includes AudioScore Lite from Neuratron, which allows you to input music from an acoustic instrument or your voice, simply by playing or recording into AudioScore via a microphone.

To use AudioScore Lite, simply choose **File ▶ Transcribe with AudioScore** from Sibelius's menus.

1.9 Selections and passages

- New modifier keys for dragging selected single objects. To use these modifier keys, first select the object and hold the mouse button down before you add the modifier key. These modifiers can also be used in combination (e.g. holding **Shift** and **Alt** to constrain an object's movement in a particular direction and move it without re-attaching it at any point). The new modifiers are as follows:
 - **Shift**-drag: constrains the movement of the object in the direction in which you first move it
 - **Alt**+drag or **⌘**-drag: moves the item without moving its attachment point
 - **Ctrl**+drag or **⌘**-drag: temporarily disables Magnetic Layout for that item so that it can move wherever you drag it, then pops back into its avoided position when you release **Ctrl** or **⌘**.
- The keyboard shortcuts for navigating between notes and chords in different voices and on different staves have been thoroughly revised, as follows:
 - **Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**↑**/**↓** selects the next highest or lowest note in the chord. If the highest or lowest note of the chord is selected, typing **Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**↑**/**↓** selects any tremolos on the stem (if present), typing **Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**↑**/**↓** again selects the handle at the end of the stem (if the stem is pointing in that direction), and typing it again selects the articulation nearest to the note, if any are present.
 - **Shift**+**Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**⌘**+**↑**/**↓** selects the highest or lowest note in the next used voice (so if you have selected, for example, the bottom note of a chord in voice 1 and type **Shift**+**Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**⌘**+**↑**/**↓**, Sibelius will select the highest note in voice 2, if present; if not, the highest note in voice 3, or voice 4).
 - **Ctrl**+**Alt**+**↓** or **⌘**+**⌘**+**↓** selects the highest pitch or rest in the lowest numbered voice on the staff below; **Ctrl**+**Alt**+**↑** or **⌘**+**⌘**+**↑** selects the lowest pitch or rest in the highest numbered voice on the staff above.

If there is no note or rest at the same rhythmic position in the next voice or staff, Sibelius will select the note or rest at the nearest rhythmic position earlier in the same bar. Voices that are not present are simply skipped, and when moving between staves, hidden staves are likewise skipped.

- Navigation left and right through notes and chords, accidentals, articulations, ties and rhythm dots, by typing **Alt**+**←**/**→** or **⌘**+**←**/**→**, has also been improved. The order of selection from left to right when typing **Alt**+**→** or **⌘**+**→** is now as follows: arpeggio line; scoop or plop; accidental; note-head; rhythm dot; fall or doit; tie left-hand end; tie; tie right-hand end. Sibelius attempts to select the note nearest in pitch to the last-selected note when hopping left and right between notes.
- When you select notes, the rules for which notes are sounded via **Play notes as you edit** (on the **Note input** page of **Preferences**) have been improved, as follows:
 - **←**/**→** plays all of the notes in the chord in that voice, so that moving through notes and chords on a staff quickly allows you to hear the selected note in context.
 - **Alt**+**←**/**→** or **⌘**+**←**/**→** plays only the selected notehead.
 - **Alt**+**↑**/**↓** or **⌘**+**↑**/**↓** plays only the selected notehead.
 - Clicking on a single notehead within a chord now plays only that note; double-clicking a selected chord plays all of the notes in that chord. (If you would prefer Sibelius to play the

whole chord when selecting any note of a chord, switch on **Play all notes in chord when any note selected**.)

- **Ctrl+click** or **⌘-click** to select multiple notes within a chord now plays only the selected notes.
- Adding or removing an accidental (either by deleting a selected accidental, or by adding one from the Keypad) now plays the affected note.
- When copying from a score that uses user-defined instrument types, those user-defined instrument types are only copied to the destination score if they end up getting used in the pasted selection. This helps to reduce style “bloat” when copying and pasting between scores.
- The context menu that appears when an item is selected now includes the **Order**, **Magnetic Layout** and **Chord Symbol** submenus from the main **Edit** menu.

1.10 Input devices

- Sibelius now supports MIDI Machine Control (MMC), which is a standard way for hardware input devices to specify playback controls such as start, stop, fast-forward, rewind, etc. If your input device supports MMC, you can now use it to control the Playback window in Sibelius.
- New **Record system exclusive messages** checkbox on the **Input Devices** page of **Preferences**. Switch this checkbox off if you find that you cannot restart Sibelius after quitting it: this is a symptom of buggy audio device drivers that do not correctly release the buffer required to record system exclusive MIDI messages (required for HyperControl support – see below.)

1.11 HyperControl™

Sibelius is now compatible with HyperControl, the MIDI mapping technology used in M-Audio Axiom Pro controller keyboards. HyperControl automatically maps the knobs, faders, drum pads and numeric keypad buttons on the keyboard to playback, Mixer and note input controls in Sibelius, via a two-way link that ensures the keyboard's controls are always in sync with the settings in Sibelius. The Axiom Pro's LCD display constantly updates to show the current values, to ensure seamless editing and prevent parameter jumps.

2.1 Accidentals

Sibelius now adds cautionary (or courtesy) accidentals all by itself wherever they're needed, so you'll get fewer wrong notes in performance. The new options are all found on the **Accidentals and Dots** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, and allow Sibelius to show cautionaries:

- where a note has an accidental in the previous bar, any note at the same pitch in the following bar has a cautionary “cancelling” the accidental (the cautionary will only appear if the first note of the bar is of the same pitch as the note with the accidental in the previous bar, if **Apply auto cautionaries only up to first note of next bar** is switched on)
- where a note with an accidental is tied over a barline, any note at the same pitch in the following bar has a cautionary “cancelling” the accidental
- where a previous note in a different octave had a different accidental (e.g. if you write C#5 C4 it puts a cautionary natural on the C4), if **Show cautionary accidentals on all octaves** is switched on.

You can choose whether or not Sibelius should only show cautionaries on the first note of the bar, i.e. if the first note of the next bar is at the same pitch as a note that has an accidental in the last bar.

Sibelius can also now show an accidental on the second note of a tied pair if a note is tied across a system break (and determine whether this accidental should be drawn in parentheses).

For music that uses multiple voices on a single staff (e.g. two players or singers reading from the same staff, or polyphonic music for piano or guitar), Sibelius can also display cautionary accidentals on notes where the accidental has previously been seen in the bar in a different voice.

You can choose whether any, some or all of these new automatic accidentals should be drawn in parentheses.

In previous versions, Sibelius would always cancel any accidentals if a clef change occurred in the middle of a bar (so in D major, writing an F following a clef change in the middle of a bar that already included an F natural would produce F#). This behavior did not follow the typical conventions of music notation, so a new **Reset accidentals to current key signature on clef change** option has been added to the **Clefs and Key Signatures** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, switched on by default in existing scores (so as to preserve Sibelius's old behavior), but switched off in newly-created scores. When this option is switched off, any accidentals before the clef change will continue to take effect after the clef change, until the end of the bar. If the new option to draw automatic cautionary accidentals is switched on, Sibelius will also restate any accidentals on notes following a mid-bar clef change that differ from the key signature, to prevent ambiguity.

The **Update Score** dialog that appears when opening scores created in earlier versions of Sibelius contains a new option, **Draw automatic cautionary accidentals**. Switching on this option causes Sibelius to switch on the new **Draw cautionary accidentals where accidentals in previous bar differed from key signature**, **Show auto cautionaries in all octaves**, **Restate accidental when note is tied across a system break**, **Show restated accidentals on ties in parentheses** and **Restate accidental when seen in a new voice** options.

2.2 Arpeggios

New note-attached arpeggio lines have been added to the new **Jazz articulations** Keypad layout: **/** (= on Mac) produces a standard arpeggio line, **/** (on Mac) produces an “upwards” arpeggio line with an arrowhead at the top, and **–** (on Mac) produces a “downwards” arpeggio line with an arrowhead at the bottom.

Each arpeggio line is created at the appropriate height for the chord to which it is attached, and automatically gets longer or shorter as notes are added to or removed from the chord.

To adjust the default length and distance from the notehead of note-attached arpeggio lines, use the new options on the **Lines** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**.

To adjust the length of an individual arpeggio line, click either end and drag it up or down, or use **↑/↓**. To reset the length of an arpeggio line, select it and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**. You can also move an individual arpeggio line left or right by selecting it and typing **Alt+←/→** or **⇧←/→**.

2.3 Articulations

Sibelius 6 includes many improvements to the default positioning of articulations, controlled by new options added to the **Articulations** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**:

- By default, staccato, staccatissimo, wedge and tenuto that occur on the first or last note of a slur are always drawn inside the slur (in other words, between the notehead and the slur's end point),

and accent, marcato etc. are drawn outside slurs. The other common convention, however, is that accent and marcato articulations should also be drawn inside the slur. This can now be achieved by switching on the appropriate **...inside start or end of slur** checkbox for these articulations.

- Sibelius similarly accommodates the different conventions about the placement of articulations inside tuplets. By default, upbow and downbow markings are always drawn outside tuplet brackets, while other articulations are drawn inside. You can edit which articulations behave in this manner by switching on the appropriate **...inside tuplet** checkbox.
- To determine which articulations should go within the curvature of a slur and which should go outside, use the **...inside middle of slur** checkboxes. These checkboxes only take effect if Magnetic Layout is switched on, and if slurs are set to automatically avoid collisions with objects under their arcs. In existing scores, all of these checkboxes are switched on, to maintain as closely as possible the behavior of previous versions of Sibelius. In newly-created scores, all articulations except for the upbow, downbow and fermatas (pauses) are allowed within the curvature of the slur. In cases where both a slur and a tuplet are present, the settings prescribed by the **...inside tuplet** row of checkboxes will take precedence over the **...inside middle of slur** settings, because tuplets are typically closer to notes than slurs and therefore should have a naturally higher priority.
- Where upbow or downbow articulations on notes at the start or end of a slur coincide with other articulations (e.g. staccato, tenuto) that are conventionally positioned inside the slur, Sibelius now positions the bowing marks outside the slur.
- Articulations that have the appropriate **Always above** checkbox set will now never flip below the note. Bowing marks and other articulations that are set to be **Always above** will never appear below the staff, except in the case where multiple voices are used, and the “stems down” voice (e.g. voice 2) has (say) a bowing mark. (To preserve the behavior of previous versions of Sibelius, switch on the new option **Allow 'always above' articulations to be flipped below.**)
- You can now vary the gap between the top or bottom line of the staff and articulations that appear outside the staff (e.g. staccatos on stem-down notes on the top space or second line of the staff) using the new ***n* spaces outside staff for articulations not allowed in staff** option.
- Sibelius automatically prevents accents, marcatos, wedges and staccatissimos (which are allowed to appear in the staff by default) from appearing in the space adjacent to a notehead in a space; instead, any such articulation is removed by one space, improving legibility. (To preserve the behavior of previous versions of Sibelius, switch off the new option **Allow extra space for accents, marcatos, wedges and staccatissimos in staff.**)
- When Magnetic Layout is switched on, articulations are now allowed to move vertically in order to avoid collisions with ties and accidentals.
- The new option **New articulation positioning rule**, which is switched on in new scores, fixes a number of problems with articulation positioning, including:
 - making the vertical position of articulations outside the staff uniform on notes of different pitches
 - ensuring fermatas (pauses) above a quarter (crotchet) rest do not touch the staff
 - ensuring articulations that are allowed in the staff (e.g. staccatos) do not sometimes appear one space too far away from the notehead

- ensuring articulations on stem-down voices (voice 2 and voice 4) are positioned correctly when flipped
- ensuring fermatas on stem-down voices will only go below the staff if there is also a rest in a stem-up voice (voice 1 or voice 3) in the same bar
- making staccato dots appear in the correct position relative to notes lower than the middle line of the staff, when both the note and the articulation are flipped.

Sibelius 6 also features improvements for adjusting the positions of individual articulations.

You can now adjust the individual distances between articulations stacked above or below the note: if multiple articulations are stacked above or below a note, moving the articulation nearest the note will move the other articulations by the same amount; if you want to increase the distance between two individual articulations, select the one furthest from the notehead and move that one. To undo all changes in position produced by moving articulations, select the affected note and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**. To move an individual articulation back to its original position, select only that articulation and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**.

In situations where you have e.g. a bowing mark above a note on the stem side, and a staccato and tenuto below the note on the notehead side, you can now adjust the vertical position of each set of articulations independently. Select the note and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position** to reset all articulations back to their default positions; to reset those above or below the note independently, select only those articulations you want to reset and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**.

2.4 Barlines

Adding a special barline (or a key signature, which in turn adds a double barline) to a barline where a clef change occurs no longer causes Sibelius to hang.

2.5 Bars and bar rests

The drop-down menu of bar rest types has been removed from the **Bars** panel of Properties (see **5.17 Properties** below):

- Repeat bars are now created via the Keypad (see **2.27 Repeat bars** below)
- Invisible bar rests are now created simply by hiding normal bar rests
- Double whole note (breve) bar rests are automatically created for appropriate time signatures (e.g. 4/2), by way of the new **Use double whole note (breve) bar rests in 4/2 and 3/1** option on the **Bar Rests** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, switched on in new scores.

2.6 Beam groups

- Sibelius now allows you to create feathered beams very simply, using new buttons on the third Keypad layout (shortcut F9): **0** produces an *accel.* feathered beam, and **.** (period) produces a *rit.* feathered beam. Beams cannot be feathered if they cross a system or page break. It is possible to feather the “beams” that appear between two-note tremolos, except when the **Outer tremolo touching stems** option is chosen on the **Notes and Tremolos** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**.
- The **Separate tuplets from adjacent notes** option in **Beam and Rest Groups**, accessed via **Create ▶ Time Signature**, is now switched off by default for newly-created time signatures.

2.7 Beam positions

- New **Also for middle rests** checkbox on the **Beams and Stems** page of **Engraving Rules**, allowing the **Horizontal if middle notes intrude by n spaces** option to apply to beamed groups with rests in the middle. Switching this on corrects beam angles for groups that would be flat if they consisted only of notes.
- You can now change the angle of a beam on a beamed group that begins or ends with a rest, exactly as if the beamed group begins or ends with a note.
- It is now possible to select a beam when the beamed group begins with a rest.
- Stems no longer appear on the wrong side of the note on beamed notes that appear on the middle staff line when crossed to the staff below.
- **Move to Original Staff** has been returned to the **Notes ▶ Cross-Staff Notes** submenu, making it easier to undo problems with cross-staff beaming, particularly when crossing notes between three staves.

2.8 Beamed rests and stemlets

Sibelius now includes stemlets (or “half-stems”) for rests in beamed groups, which can be switched on via the new **Use stemlets on beamed rests** option on the **Beams and Stems** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**:

- Options are provided to determine the minimum length of stemlets, whether they should extend into the staff or stop outside the staff, and whether beamed groups with stemlets should always have a horizontal beam, or follow the normal beam angle specified by the pitches of the notes in the group.
- You can adjust the length of an individual stemlet: click on the end of the stemlet inside the beam, and a small handle will appear. Click and drag with the mouse or use $\uparrow/\downarrow$ arrow keys (with **Ctrl** or $\#$ for larger steps) to adjust them. You can also use the **Y** parameter in the **General** panel of **Properties** to adjust the stemlet's length numerically. To reset a stemlet to its default length, select it and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Position**.
- Stemlets can be added or removed for individual beamed rests using the new stemlet button on the third Keypad layout (shortcut – on Windows, on Mac). To restore a beamed rest to its default state, select it and choose **Layout ▶ Reset Design**.

Other new options for beamed rests on the **Beams and Stems** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** include:

- The **Beam over rests** and **Beam to and from rests** options have been moved from **Beam and Rest Groups**, accessed via **Create ▶ Time Signature**. These options no longer apply to individual time signatures, and instead now apply to the whole score.
- New **Adjust stem lengths to avoid beamed rests** option, switched on in new scores. When this option is switched on, if you move a beamed rest up or down, Sibelius will adjust the position of the beam to ensure that the rest and beam do not collide.
- New **Break secondary beams** option, enabled only if **Beam over rests** is switched on, and switched off by default. When switched on, Sibelius draws only the primary beam above or below a beamed rest, allowing the beamed group to be more vertically compact by reducing the amount of displacement required to prevent the rest and beam from colliding.

When opening scores created in earlier versions of Sibelius, the Update Score dialog that appears has two new options for handling beamed rests:

- **Keep custom beam groupings** is enabled (and switched on by default) when opening scores created in Sibelius 3 or later. When switched on, Sibelius will ensure that any edits made to beam groupings (e.g. using the Keypad) are preserved, even if you subsequently change the **Beam over rests** and/or **Beam to and from rests** options in **Engraving Rules**. Sibelius will also set these new **Engraving Rules** options for you, based on the beam group settings of the first time signature in the score. If you want to set the beams back to their defaults, select a passage or the whole score and choose **Notes ▶ Reset Beam Groups**.
- **Adjust stem lengths to avoid beamed rests** simply switches on the corresponding option in **Engraving Rules** for the score.

2.11 Clefs

- New sub-bass F clef, which is like a normal bass clef positioned on the top line of the staff, with pitches two octaves below a treble clef.
- The arrow keys and mouse scroll wheel now work as expected in the **Create ▶ Clef** dialog (Mac only).

2.15 Guitar notation and tab

- The default shape of bend lines on notation staves is now much improved by default.
- It is now possible to adjust the position of the mid-point of bends on notation staves, making it possible to change their angle individually.
- Guitar bend lines now show handles when selected or when **View ▶ Handles** is switched on.
- The positions of the end points of bends on both notation and tab staves on either side of a system or page break can now be edited independently.
- When a bend crosses a system or page break, Sibelius ensures that the continuation of the bend on the new system starts above the tab staff, so it's easy to see.
- Guitar bends no longer flip incorrectly over page breaks.

2.16 Guitar scale diagrams

New **Create ▶ Other ▶ Guitar Scale Diagram** dialog, for creating special kinds of chord diagrams that show how to play all the notes of a scale (or how to play a lick or riff) by showing lots of dots on the same diagram. Sibelius comes with a library of more than 1500 ready-made scale diagrams for nearly 30 different types of scales, but you can easily create your own:

- Add multiple dots to the same string in a guitar scale diagram (but not in a regular chord diagram). To remove a dot, right-click (Windows) or **Control-click** (Mac) the dot.
- Cycle through various symbols for the dots on the strings (black filled circle, white circle with black outline, black filled square, white square with black outline, black filled diamond, white diamond with black outline) by **Shift-clicking** on an existing dot on the diagram. These symbols represent different fingerings etc. in scale diagrams. (You can also use multiple dot designs in chord diagrams, if you wish.)
- Double-clicking on a dot in a scale diagram now allows you to type text that will appear inside the dot (as white text on a black filled shape, or black text on a white filled shape), which is use-

ful for showing fingerings or note names in scale diagrams. (You can also add fingering to the dots in chord diagrams, if you wish.) Right-click (Windows) *or* **Control**-click (Mac) while editing text to see a word menu containing accidentals, or simply type them using **Ctrl+7/8/9** *or* **⌘7/8/9** on the numeric keypad.

New options for guitar scale diagrams on the **Guitar** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**:

- Switch on the new **Show string pitches at left-hand side** option to show the pitch names of the strings in a horizontal scale diagram. Set **Distance from frame *n* spaces** to determine the gap between the pitch names and the left-hand side of the scale diagram.
- Number the frets below a horizontal scale diagram by switching on **Number 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 12th frets**. Set **Distance from frame *n* spaces** to determine the gap between the fret numbers and the bottom of the scale diagram. When this option is switched on, the single fret number at the lowest fret shown in a diagram (e.g. “5fr.”) is not drawn for horizontal chord or scale diagrams.

2.18 Instruments

- When deleting a staff using the **Create ▶ Instruments** dialog, any passage or single selection that was made before the staff was deleted is now correctly preserved.
- When instrument changes are made cue-sized, any music text font characters in the instrument change text are now spaced correctly (Windows only).
- The transpositions of the Wagner Tuba in B♭ and Wagner Tuba in F instruments have been corrected in newly-created scores.

2.19 Jazz articulations

Scoops, falls, doits and plops can now be added to notes quickly from the new fifth Keypad layout (shortcut F11) – no need to use symbols. Like other articulations, they are automatically positioned and transpose along with the notes, but you can also move them individually. Falls and doits even play back automatically on suitable playback devices (e.g. Garritan Jazz and Big Band).

The new **Jazz articulations** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** allows you to determine the default positioning of these new articulations, but they can also be moved on a case-by-case basis by dragging with the mouse, or by selecting them and typing **Shift+Alt+←/→** *or* **⇧⌘←/→**.

2.20 Key signatures

The arrow keys and mouse scroll wheel now work as expected in the **Create ▶ Key Signature** dialog (Mac only).

2.21 Lines

- Hairpins now appear above vocal staves by default in new scores (see **3.1 Working with text**, **8.12 Default Positions** and **8.14 Edit Instruments** below for more details).
- New staff-attached lines for *Hauptstimme* and *Nebenstimme* in the **Create ▶ Line** dialog.
- Selecting the ends of “wiggly” lines, such as trills, arpeggios, glissandos etc. is now easier, because the handle at the end is now drawn on the visible end of the line, rather than sometimes being further right or left than the visible end of the line.

- The vertical position of the right-hand end of the first segment of a line and the position of the left-hand end of the second segment of a line that crosses a system break can now be moved independently of the right-hand end of the entire line.
- It is now possible to drag the second segment of a hairpin that crosses a system or page break up and down independently of the vertical position of the first segment of the hairpin.
- The arrow keys and mouse scroll wheel now work as expected in the **Create ▶ Line** and **House Style ▶ Edit Lines** dialogs (Mac only).
- **Create ▶ Line** (and **House Style ▶ Edit Lines**) now includes a read-out of the name of the selected line.

2.23 Manuscript paper

All manuscript papers have been fully updated to use the latest Sibelius 6 features, and a couple of minor bugs have been fixed, including substantial revisions to the **Concert band** and **Concert band, small manuscript papers**, correct trombones in the **Brass band** manuscript paper, and the fixing of a typo in the **Pop group** manuscript paper. Manuscript papers for chamber ensembles no longer show instrument names after the first system.

All manuscript papers supplied with Sibelius 6 include the following changes:

- **Layout ▶ Document Setup:**
 - Default staff size is now 7mm (0.28") again in most manuscript papers
 - Margins on all sides of A4 pages are 12.7mm (0.5")
 - First page top staff margin is now 38.1mm (1.5"), to make room for title text etc.
 - First page bottom staff margin is now 12.7mm (0.5"), to make room for copyright text, etc.
 - Subsequent pages top and bottom staff margins are 12.7mm (0.5") and 7.6mm (0.3") respectively.
- **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules:**
 - Automatic cautionary accidentals are shown by default, including accidentals in parentheses for tied notes over systems, and cautionaries for notes in each voice in multiple voice passages (using the options on the **Accidentals** page)
 - Staccatissimo, wedge, accent, marcato and harmonic articulations are all set to be **Allowed in staff** (on the **Articulations** page)
 - Staccatissimo and wedge articulations are now set to appear inside slurs by default (using the **Inside slur** options), and the position of articulations in many circumstances is improved (by switching on **New articulation positioning rule**)
 - Accents, marcatos, wedges and staccatissimos allowed in the staff now appear displaced by one space from the notehead to which they are attached, if that note is in the top or bottom space in the staff (by switching on **Allow extra space for accents, marcatos, wedges and staccatissimos in staff** on the **Articulations** page)
 - Upbow and downbow articulations are not allowed to appear inside tuplet brackets (using the **Inside tuplet** options on the **Articulations** page)
 - Successive one-bar repeat bars are set to be numbered every four bars, with the bar numbers shown in parentheses (using the options on the **Bar Rests** page)

What's new?

- Bars of eight quarter (crotchet) beats in length (e.g. 4/2) now display double whole note (breve) rests by default (using the option on the **Bar Rests** page)
- Beamed rests that use stemlets are set to be horizontal by default, and to allow stemlets to extend into the staff (using the options on the **Beams and Stems** page)
- Clefs no longer reset the accidentals of notes preceding a mid-bar clef change (using the options on the **Clefs and Key Signatures** page)
- The options on the new **Chord Symbols** page have been set to appropriate defaults
- Sibelius now allows 3 extra spaces between bracketed groups of instruments, 3 extra spaces below vocal staves (for lyrics), and 3 extra spaces above staves set to show system objects. Additionally, Sibelius will no longer justify the gap between the two braced staves of keyboard instruments.
- Large and small hairpin apertures both set to 1.25 spaces, and both large and small continuation apertures set to 0.75 spaces.
- Positions of slurs near note stems have been improved.
- **House Style ▶ Edit Instruments:**
 - The following instruments have had their comfortable and professional ranges adjusted: Bass in E $\flat$, Bass in B $\flat$, Euphonium, Tenor Horn, Baritone in B $\flat$, Flugelhorn, Cornet in B $\flat$, Soprano Cornet in E $\flat$
 - The following new instruments have been added: Trumpet in D [no key], Trumpet in E $\flat$ [no key], Trumpet in F [no key], Trumpet in A [no key], Bass guitar [tab] (i.e. a tab instrument with rhythms), Contrabass Flute, Sub-contrabass Flute, Double Contrabass Flute, Flexatone, Electric Piano (FM), Music Box, Percussive Organ, Rock Organ, Reed Organ, Synth Bass 1, Synth Bass 2, Synth Strings 1, Synth Strings 2, Synth Voice, Orchestra Hit, Synth Brass 1, Synth Bass 2, Blown Bottle, Whistling, Lead 1 (Square), Lead 2 (Sawtooth), Lead 3 (Calliope), Lead 4 (Chiff), Lead 5 (Charang), Lead 6 (Voice), Lead 7 (Fifths), Lead 8 (Bass + Lead), Pad 1 (New Age), Pad 2 (Warm), Pad 3 (Polysynth), Pad 4 (Choir), Pad 5 (Bowed), Pad 6 (Metallic), Pad 7 (Halo), Pad 8 (Sweep), FX 1 (Rain), FX 2 (Soundtrack), FX 3 (Crystal), FX 4 (Atmosphere), FX 5 (Brightness), FX 6 (Goblins), FX 7 (Echoes), FX 8 (Sci-fi), Shamisen, Koto, Fiddle, Shanai, Tinkle Bell, Melodic Toms, Synth Drums, Reverse Cymbals, Guitar Fret Noise, Reverse Cymbals, Breath Noise, Gunshot, Taiko Drums [5 lines]
 - The **Cuban Unpitched Percussion** family in the **All instruments** ensemble has been renamed as **Latin American Unpitched Percussion**, to more accurately reflect the region of origin of some of its instruments
 - The **Common instruments** ensemble now contains guitar tab instruments that don't show rhythms for all the standard guitar instruments
 - Staves for vocal instruments (e.g. Soprano, Tenor, etc.) now have stems pointing downwards on the middle line of the staff by default. All vocal instruments also have the new **Vocal staff** option set, allowing dynamics to be positioned above by default, and allowing Sibelius to provide additional space below the staff for lyrics.
 - The default drum set/kit instruments now include a notehead for the snare drum rim shot sound, as specified in Norman Weinberg's *Standardized Drumset Notation* book

- The transposition of the Piccolo trumpet in A and Piccolo trumpet in B $\flat$ instruments has been corrected.
- Lines:
 - New lines in **Create ▶ Line** for Hauptstimme and Nebenstimme
 - Crescendo and diminuendo hairpins now have a suitable default position for appearing above vocal staves
 - All hairpins are now -4.5 spaces above the staff (from -4.31 spaces in previous versions)
- **Layout ▶ Magnetic Layout** is switched on by default
- **House Style ▶ Note Spacing Rule**:
 - **Empty bar width determined by time signature** is now switched on
 - The default gap between lyrics is now 0.75 spaces
- In **Play ▶ Dictionary**, the **Staff Text** words “palm mute”, “pm” and “P.M.” are now set to produce sound ID changes until the next sound ID change, rather than until the next note
- **Create ▶ Symbol**:
 - The vertical position of 2- and 4-bar repeat symbols has been corrected
 - The symbol for the black cluster describing an interval of a ninth on the **Clusters** row has now been corrected
- Text styles:
 - New **Repeat bar numbers** text style, used for numbering successive repeat bars
 - New **Comment** text style, used by **Create ▶ Comment**
 - New **Chord diagram fret numbers** and **Chord diagram string names** text styles, used by horizontal chord diagrams and guitar scale diagrams
 - The line spacing of the **Figured bass** text style has been set to 70%
 - **Expression** text now has a suitable default position for appearing above vocal staves
 - **Fingering** is now left-aligned rather than center-aligned by default
 - **Block lyrics** is now 18 spaces below the bottom of the staff (from 15 spaces)
 - **Title**, **Subtitle**, **Dedication** are all eight spaces higher above the staff by default.
 - **Composer**, **Lyricist** both two spaces higher above the staff by default.

2.25 Noteheads

Slash noteheads no longer transpose incorrectly on transposing instruments when **Notes ▶ Transposing Score** is toggled on and off.

2.27 Repeat bars

You can now create 1-bar, 2-bar and 4-bar repeats directly from the new **Jazz articulations** Keypad layout (shortcut F11). Sibelius always ensures that all bars of 2- and 4-bar repeats are kept on the same system, and will not allow them to be consolidated into multirests.

There are new options on the **Bar Rests** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** for numbering 1-bar repeats: you can choose to number repeat bars every 1, 2, 4 or 8 bars, optionally show the numbers in parentheses, and optionally restart the numbering at double barlines and rehearsal marks.

Sibelius 6 now also plays back 1-bar, 2-bar and 4-bar repeats, if there are no notes that are set to play back in the same bar as the repeat bar symbol (you can, however, have notes that have none of the Play on pass checkboxes in the Playback panel of Properties switched on). Sibelius will play back markings like dynamics etc. over passages of repeat bars, but markings that change the sound (e.g. *pizz.*) will only take effect at the end of the passage of repeat bars; if there are multiple markings that change the sound, only the final one will have any effect.

2.28 Slurs

Sibelius 6 now has the most beautiful and controllable slurs of any program. When Magnetic Layout is switched on, magnetic slurs now automatically avoid collisions with objects under their arc – e.g. notes, accidentals and articulations – by changing their shape and moving their end points automatically to find the best fit.

This behavior is automatically enabled in new scores created in Sibelius 6.1, and when you open scores created in versions of Sibelius prior to Sibelius 6, switching on the **Use Magnetic Layout** checkbox in **Update Score** will also enable collision avoidance for slurs. When you open a score created in Sibelius 6.0 in Sibelius 6.1, you will be asked whether you want to enable collision avoidance for slurs: if you click **Yes**, Sibelius will also ensure various other options in **Engraving Rules** are switched on, so that the collision avoidance will work correctly.

To disable collision avoidance for all slurs in your score, choose **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, go to the **Slurs** page, and switch off **Adjust shape to avoid collisions under arc**.

To disable collision avoidance for an individual slur, select it and switch off the **Avoid collisions under arc** checkbox on the **Lines** panel of Properties. Such a slur will not allow other objects (e.g. text, lyrics, lines, etc.) to collide with it, but it will itself not adjust its shape to avoid collisions with notes etc. under its arc. To make a slur completely oblivious to collisions of any kind, select it and choose **Edit ▶ Magnetic Layout ▶ Off**.

The frame that appears around a selected slur will be colored red if **Avoid collisions under arc** is switched off for a particular slur. Non-magnetic slurs (which are colored red when selected) cannot avoid collisions with other objects, and so will always show a red frame. If Magnetic Layout is switched off altogether, or if the **Adjust shape to avoid collisions under arc** option in **Engraving Rules** is switched off, all slurs will show a gray frame when selected.

You can still adjust the position of a slur's end points and adjust its shape when it is set to avoid collisions in the usual way: Sibelius will use your positioning choices as a hint to help it make the most pleasing shape. You can determine how Sibelius chooses to adjust slur shapes by default using the new options in **Engraving Rules**:

- **Minimum gap around slurs *n* spaces** determines how close to objects under their arc slurs should be positioned.
- **Move ends if slur exceeds *n* spaces high** determines the height of the slur beyond which Sibelius will prefer to move the end points rather than increase the curvature in order to avoid a collision. Increase this value to allow more steeply curved slurs, and reduce it for more gently curved arcs; to force Sibelius never to move the end points unless absolutely unavoidable, set this to a very high number (e.g. 20 spaces).

- The slider allows you to balance the movement of the end points versus changing the curvature of the slur; try out different values to see what you prefer.
- **Make ends level when slur is shorter than n spaces** determines the maximum length of slur for which Sibelius should force the end points to be horizontal if the first and last notes under the slur are at the same staff position.

Not only is the default design and position of slurs even better in all kinds of situations, but you can adjust their shape using no fewer than six handles:

- Each end point has its own handle, as in previous versions.
- The control point between the two end points inside the slur's arc moves the entire slur without changing its shape. Normally you would only want to move the slur up or down, but it is possible to move the entire slur left and right as well.
- The control point between the two end points outside the slur's arc allows you to change the height of the curvature of the slur symmetrically. Moving this handle up or down or left and right moves the slur's other control points together.
- The control points that determine the curve of the slur at each end can be adjusted independently of each other. When either of these control points is selected, none of the other control points are shown as selected. These control points are also editable via new **Slur left curve** and **Slur right curve** controls on the **Lines** panel of Properties.

When editing individual slurs, note also that:

- It is now possible to adjust the curvature of both segments of a slur that crosses a system or page break independently of the other segment
- Choosing **Layout ▶ Reset Design** with only one control point of a slur selected now resets the position of just the selected control point
- **Create ▶ Other ▶ Extra Slur Arc** has been removed; multi-arc slurs in scores created in earlier versions will still display in Sibelius 6 and can be manipulated in the same limited fashion as in earlier versions, but the recommended way to produce an S-shaped slur in Sibelius 6 is to use the new slur control points, which allow much finer and more predictable control of slur shape.

To further improve the default shapes of slurs, a number of new options have been added to the **Slurs** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**:

- New **Shoulder for short slurs $n\%$** and **Shoulder for long slurs $n\%$** options: Sibelius can now scale the default shoulder of slurs as their length changes, leading to subtle changes in the rate of onset of the slur's curvature for longer slurs.
- New **Height scale $n\%$** option: Sibelius by default draws slurs such that a short slur (defined as a slur of two spaces in length) will be one space high, and scales using an exponential function that approaches an asymptote as the slur lengthens; in practice, slurs will never be taller than four spaces with the default values. By adjusting the **Height scale** control, you can adjust the default height of the slur (e.g. a value of 200% produces slurs that tend towards 8 spaces tall; a value of 50% produces slurs that tend towards 2 spaces tall). Furthermore, a new **Limit height for long slurs** option has been added that provides a way of limiting the height of slurs; this is useful if you generally want quite curvy slurs, but want to make sure that longer slurs do not get excessively curvy.

- New **Middle thickness** option: this sets the default thickness of slurs (you can adjust the thickness of individual slurs using the new **Slur thickness** control on the **Lines** panel of Properties). Thickness is expressed in spaces, though note that the value represents the thickness of the slur's width, less the minimum thickness of the slur (so a value of 0.5 spaces produces a slur that is just over half a space thick).
- The old **Minimum thickness** value has been renamed as **Outline width** to more accurately reflect its true purpose.

Sibelius now automatically positions slurs correctly above or below the notes based on the stem directions of all of the notes encompassed by the slur, controlled by a new option, **Position slurs on mixed stem notes above the notes**, on the **Slurs** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, which is switched on by default in newly-created scores. Sibelius will even automatically position slurs intelligently when you add slurs to simultaneous notes in two voices.

A number of other problems with slurs that existed in earlier versions have also been addressed:

- Slurs no longer move in the wrong direction when adjusting their position or shape using the arrow keys.
- Rotating a slur (e.g. by dragging its left- or right-hand end) no longer results in the thickness of the slur changing as the angle of the slur changes.
- The appearance of slurs on small staves has been greatly improved
- The positions of the ends of slurs on cue-sized notes has been substantially improved.
- If grace notes are slurred to a note with an articulation and the slur is flipped, the articulation now correctly moves back to its regular position.

2.29 Staves

- When creating an ossia staff above or below a passage selection of a single bar, staff lines no longer extend beyond the barline at the start of the ossia by default.
- When creating an ossia staff on the penultimate bar of a score, the ossia staff no longer incorrectly shows a final barline at the end of the ossia.
- Hidden repeat bar symbols no longer prevent otherwise empty staves from being hidden.

2.30 Stems and leger lines

The default width of leger lines on half note (minim), whole note (semibreve) and bar rests has been improved. Furthermore, a new **Leger lines extend beyond rest by *n*% of its width** option on the **Notes and Tremolos** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** now allows precise control over the width of leger lines on such rests.

2.31 Symbols

- It is now possible to move around the **Create ▶ Symbol** and **House Style ▶ Edit Symbols** dialogs using the arrow keys: use **Ctrl+←/→** or **⌘←/→** arrow move to the start and end of a row, and use **Page Up/Page Down** or **Ctrl+↑/↓** or **⌘↑/↓** to move up and down the grid a screenful at a time.
- A new read-out has been added to both dialogs showing the name of the selected symbol.
- The vertical position of each fragment of a system symbol (or a system text object, rehearsal mark or system line) is now independent of the topmost fragment. This means that you can drag

any fragment of one of these system objects up and down without altering the vertical position of system objects elsewhere on the system.

2.32 Ties

- You can now adjust the default outline thickness and middle thickness of ties independently of slurs (see **2.28 Slurs** above), using the new **Thickness** controls on the **Ties 1** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**.
- It is now possible to adjust the curvature of both segments of a tie that crosses a system or page break independently of the other segment.
- It is now possible to edit the horizontal position of the right-hand end point of the first segment of a tie and the left-hand end point of the second segment of a tie that crosses a system or page break.

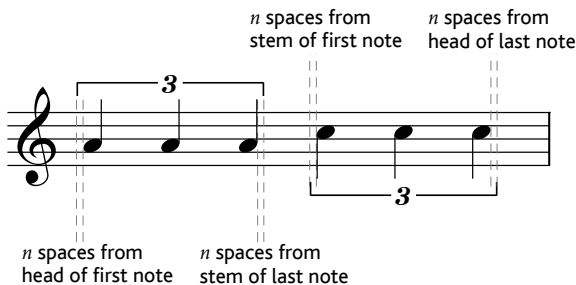
2.35 Triplets and other tuplets

Tuplet numbers and brackets are now positioned above notes by default, unless all of the stems of the notes in the tuplet point downwards, or if the implied beam encompassing the notes in the tuplet would force the stems to point downwards.

This new rule is enabled by setting the radio button **Position tuplets as if all notes were beamed together** on the **Tuplets** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**. This rule is used in newly-created scores, but is not used in existing scores (to avoid changing their appearance).

The positions of the ends of tuplet brackets relative to the first and last notes of the tuplet have also been overhauled:

- The old **Full duration** option in the **Create ▶ Tuplet** dialog has been replaced by a pair of radio buttons. **Extend to first note after tuplet** is the new name for the old **Full duration** option, and the default option is now called **Extend to last note in tuplet**.
- It is now possible to switch the duration of an existing tuplet between **Extend to last note in tuplet** and **Extend to first note after tuplet** using a drop-down in the **Notes** panel of **Properties**.
- The **Horizontal distance from note** control on the **Tuplets** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules** has been replaced with four new controls that allow you to specify the position of the left- and right-hand ends of tuplet brackets more precisely:



In the image above, *n spaces from head of first note* and *n spaces from head of last note* are both set to 0.5 spaces for illustrative purposes; by default, both these settings are set to 0 spaces, because conventionally tuplet brackets are aligned with the edge of the notehead. The *n spaces*

from stem of first note and *n* spaces from stem of last note are set to 0.5 spaces by default (the same value as shown above), to avoid the hook of the tuplet bracket at the stem end appearing to run into the stem.

The new *n* spaces from first note after tuplet control allows you to specify how far from the next note after the tuplet the tuplet bracket should end, when using the **Extend to first note after tuplet** duration option.

Finally, the behavior of auto-brackets for tuplets has been improved. A new **Hide tuplet bracket when notes joined by secondary beam** option has been added to the **Tuplets** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**. This option is switched off by default. When switched on, and when a tuplet is using an auto-bracket, Sibelius will now hide the bracket when:

- the entire tuplet is contained within the beam;
- the last note before the start of the tuplet must be an eighth note (quaver), or the first note of the tuplet must have the **Start secondary beam** option set via the Keypad;
- the first note after the tuplet must be an eighth note (quaver), or must have the **Start secondary beam** option set;
- all of the notes in the tuplet must be the same or shorter in duration than the first and last notes of the tuplet, and none may have **Start secondary beam** set.

Other improvements to tuplets in Sibelius 6:

- You can now create tuplets with ratios up to and including 1:4 and 4:1; in previous versions of Sibelius, the range of permitted ratios was between 1:2 and 2:1. This allows the use of tuplets with extreme ratios for special purposes, such as providing appropriate rhythms for complex feathered beam cases.
- New **Always above on vocal staves** option on the **Tuplets** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**. When switched on, tuplets (whether they are shown with or without brackets) will be positioned above the staff on vocal staves.

3.1 Working with text

- The **Word Menus** page of **Preferences** has been improved. Instead of displaying the plain text equivalents of each of the words in Sibelius's word menus, the words are now displayed as they appear in the word menus themselves. Because of this change, the **Apply** button now applies to both the **Text** and **Shortcut** fields (in previous versions it applied only to the text field), so don't forget to click **Apply** after changing the keyboard shortcut for a word menu item.
- Expression text now appears above vocal staves by default in new scores created in Sibelius 6 (see **2.21 Lines** above and **8.12 Default Positions** and **8.14 Edit Instruments** below).
- The vertical position of each fragment of a system text object (or a system symbol, rehearsal mark or system line) is now independent of the topmost fragment. This means that you can drag any fragment of one of these system objects up and down without altering the vertical position of system objects elsewhere on the system.
- Sibelius now once again caches the dimensions of text objects in the score, so that once each text string has been drawn once, it does not need to be measured again when it is subsequently redrawn. This results in a modest performance improvement.

3.3 Lyrics

- New **Hyphens allowed to disappear when syllables are too close together** option on the **Text** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, switched on by default. Switch off this option if you want Sibelius to force hyphens to appear even when there is insufficient space between lyric syllables for the hyphen to appear without colliding with the lyrics on either side.
- New **Adjust alignment of centered and right-aligned text on small staves** option on the **Text** page of **House Style ▶ Engraving Rules**, switched on by default in new scores but switched off in scores created in earlier versions of Sibelius. Switching this option on fixes a bug whereby Sibelius would incorrectly not display hyphens between lyrics on small staves, even when there was plenty of room.

3.5 Bar numbers

- **No bar number (and don't count bar)** bar numbers on the first bar of a repeated section no longer upset the bar numbering when **Count repeats** is switched off.
- Bar numbers shown by **View ▶ Staff Names and Bar Numbers** now display any prefix and suffix text specified as part of the bar number format.

3.7 Rehearsal marks

The vertical position of each fragment of a rehearsal mark (or a system text object, system symbol, or system line) is now independent of the topmost fragment. This means that you can drag any fragment of one of these system objects up and down without altering the vertical position of system objects elsewhere on the system.

3.9 Edit Text Styles

The **Word** menus list on the **General** page of **Edit Text Style** now uses alphabetical ordering (Mac only).

4.5 Performance

- The **Reverb** controls in **Play ▶ Performance** have been updated to provide presets for the new built-in Sibelius Player.
- New options for **ReWire** have been added – see **Playback** on page 26.
- New option to treat section ends the same as final barlines has been added – see **4.6 Repeats** below.
- New **Mixer faders scale note velocity as well as volume** option in **Play ▶ Performance**, switched on in scores created in Sibelius 5 or earlier, and switched off in new scores. When switched on, the behavior of the volume faders in the Mixer scales MIDI note on velocity as well as MIDI channel volume, which allows the playback of scores created in earlier versions to be balanced the same in Sibelius 6 as in the version in which it was created.

4.6 Repeats

The old **Play repeats** checkbox in **Play ▶ Performance** has been moved to a new **Play ▶ Repeats** dialog, which now has the following options:

- **Don't play repeats**: when this option is chosen, Sibelius will ignore all repeats in the score (the equivalent of switching off the old **Play repeats** option).

- **Automatic repeats playback:** when this option is chosen (as it is by default in new scores), Sibelius will play back repeats in the score according to its own automatic interpretation of repeat barlines, 1st- and 2nd-ending lines, and jump instructions such as D.C. al Coda. (This is the equivalent of switching on the old **Play repeats** option.)
- **Manual repeats playback:** when this option is chosen, Sibelius will play back the bars in the score in the order specified in the text control below. This allows you to specify the exact order in which the bars in the score are played back by typing ranges of bar numbers in a comma separated list. Sibelius displays the current automatic playback sequence to get you started, and you can go back to the automatic sequence by clicking **Restore Default Order**. This is useful for complex repeats sequences that cannot be played back automatically (e.g. songs with more than one coda). If you have multiple songs, pieces or movements within the same score, leave a blank line between each set of bar numbers corresponding to a single song, piece or movement to tell Sibelius to play a gap there.

When **Automatic repeats playback** is chosen, you can also switch on **Play repeats after a D.S. or D.C. jump**, which is switched on by default in newly-created scores (but switched off in existing scores to avoid changing their playback). When switched on, Sibelius will play back all the previous repeats in full following a D.S. or D.C. jump, rather than always taking the last time ending after a jump as in previous versions.

Sibelius's handling of *n*th-ending lines has also been improved. In previous versions, it was necessary for the last time ending in any repeat structure to have an open right-hand end (i.e. no vertical line at the right-hand end of the bracket). Failure to use an appropriate last time ending line could result in a number of problems in playback (e.g. infinite repeats, bar numbers disappearing and bars not playing, or subsequent *n*th-ending lines getting skipped). Sibelius is now forgiving of these situations, and now interprets any *n*th-ending line as a last time ending line if it is not followed in the next bar by another *n*th-ending line (with an open right-hand end).

System text instructions of the form **Play *n* times** no longer incorrectly apply to all subsequent repeated sections; they now apply only up to the next end repeat barline.

How Sibelius handles playback of complex repeat structures when you have written multiple songs, movements or pieces within the same score has also been improved:

- If a song, movement or piece ends with a barline other than a final barline (e.g. a double barline, or an end repeat barline), Sibelius will now recognize this as the last bar of the score, provided you switch on the **Section end** property in the **Bars** panel of Properties. This behavior is controlled by the new checkbox, **Also play gaps after section ends**, in **Play ▶ Performance**, which is switched on by default in new scores.
- Sibelius can now correctly play multiple songs, movements or pieces within the same score that each use D.C./D.S. jumps.
- If a D.C. or D.S. instruction occurs at the same location as an end repeat barline, Sibelius now plays the repeat barline on the first pass, rather than always taking the D.C./D.S. jump.

4.9 Playback dictionary

- New controls have been added to the **Articulations** page of **Play ▶ Dictionary**, allowing you to specify that fermatas (pauses) should be followed by a short gap in playback, in order to articu-

late the start of the next phrase. This can also be specified on a case-by-case basis in the score using the **Playback** panel of Properties.

- The behavior of the **Sound ID change** control has been improved.

4.12 Playback Devices

- Sibelius now fully supports the ARIA sample player used by the latest version of Garritan Personal Orchestra (GPO4), including automatic loading of sounds, and includes a sound set specifically for GPO4.
- It is now possible to tab through all of the controls in **Play ▶ Playback Devices** (Windows only).
- If you happen to give a new playback exactly the same name as an existing playback configuration, Sibelius will now automatically rename the new playback configuration to avoid silently failing to create the new configuration.

4.17 MIDI messages

MIDI controller 10 (pan) MIDI messages now correctly go from hard left (0) to hard right (127).

5.7 Filters and Find

Edit ▶ Filter ▶ Advanced Filter has been substantially improved:

- On the **Notes and Chords** page, you can now filter for:
 - grace notes as well as normal notes
 - chords with exactly *n* noteheads, at most *n* noteheads, or at least *n* noteheads
 - notes using specific notehead types (e.g. cross noteheads, slashes, etc.)
 - enharmonically equivalent pitches separately (e.g. select G $\flat$ but not F $\sharp$)
 - written pitches as well as sounding pitches
 - a range of pitches (e.g. notes between A3 and C5)
 - a range of durations (e.g. notes between an eighth (quaver) and a half note (minim) in length)
 - notes in off-beat positions (e.g. at multiples of a rhythmic position plus a further rhythmic offset)
- On the **Rests and Bar Rests** page, you can now filter for a range of rest durations, and rests in off-beat positions, in line with the improvements to the **Notes and Chords** page.
- On the **Lines** page, you can now filter for multiple line styles in the same operation: simply use **Shift-click** or **Ctrl+click** or **⌘-click** to select multiple line styles.
- The **Text** page has the following improvements:
 - It no longer lists “special” text styles (for things like hit points, chord diagram fret numbers, etc.) that are not possible to select in the score in any case.
 - A new **All text styles** option has been added to the dialog, making it simpler to search for a particular string in any text style.
 - Text matches are now case-insensitive by default; if you want to perform a case-sensitive search, switch on the new **Case sensitive** checkbox.
- A new **Clefs** page has been added, making it possible to filter for clef changes. You can select or deselect different clef types in the same filter operation: simply use **Shift-click** or **Ctrl+click** or **⌘-click** to select multiple clef styles.

What's new?

- A new **Symbols** page has been added, making it possible to filter for individual symbols. Note that you can only filter for a single symbol at once.

Many new quick filters added to the **Edit ▶ Filter** submenu, as follows:

- **Comments:** to select all comments in the selection
- **Instrument Changes:** to select all instrument changes in the selection
- **Grace Notes:** to select all grace notes in the selection
- **Hidden Objects:** to select all hidden objects in the selection
- **Pedal Lines:** to select all keyboard pedal lines in the selection
- **Rehearsal Marks:** to select all rehearsal marks in the selection (requires system selection)
- **Repeat Bars:** to select all repeat bars in the selection
- **Rests:** to select all rests and bar rests in the selection
- **Staff Text:** to select all staff text (e.g. Expression, Technique, Plain text) in the selection
- **System Text:** to select all system text (e.g. Tempo, Metronome mark) in the selection (requires system selection)
- **Symbols:** to select all staff-attached symbols in the selection (will also select system-attached symbols if a system selection is present)
- **Technique Text:** to select all text items using the Technique text style (and any user-defined text styles based on Technique) in the selection.

Improvements to existing quick filters in the **Edit ▶ Filter** submenu, as follows:

- **Dynamics:** now selects all default hairpin types, as well as any user-defined lines based on hairpins, plus all text objects using Expression text, as well as text objects using user-defined text styles based on Expression
- **Slurs:** now selects all default slur types (including dotted, dashed, etc.) as well as any user-defined lines based on slurs
- **Hairpins:** now selects all default hairpin types, as well as any user-defined lines based on hairpins
- To shorten the **Edit ▶ Filter** submenu, the **Voice 1, Voice 2, Voice 3, Voice 4, Voice 1 Only, Voice 2 Only, Voice 3 Only** and **Voice 4 Only** items have been moved to a new **Edit ▶ Filter ▶ Voices** submenu. These filters now select rests as well as notes.
- The **Top Note, 2nd Note, 3rd Note, Bottom Note, Top Note or Single Notes, 2nd Note or Single Notes, 3rd Note or Single Notes** and **Bottom Note or Single Notes** items have been moved to two new submenus: **Edit ▶ Filter ▶ Notes in Chords (For Copying)** and **Notes in Chords (For Deletion)**. The filters for copying select the brackets/numbers of any tuplets in the selection, ensuring they copy correctly; the filters for deletion do not select the brackets/numbers of any tuplets in the selection, ensuring that only the selected notes are deleted and not the entire tuplet. These filters select grace notes in addition to normal notes.

5.12 Menus and shortcuts

- A new **Keyboard language** menu has been added to the **Menus and Shortcuts** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the **Sibelius** menu on Mac), allowing you to specify the keyboard layout of your keyboard (e.g. QWERTY, AZERTY, etc.).

- The upper limit on the number of text styles and line styles that can have keyboard shortcuts defined for them has been raised from 200 to 600.
- The **Duplicate** and **Rename** buttons in the **Edit Feature Set** dialog now work as expected.

5.13 Panorama

When Sibelius moves the score during playback, the score is now always moved such that the margin displaying the prevailing clef and key signature at the left-hand side of the screen is properly taken into account. No music is therefore hidden behind the margin when the score scrolls.

5.14 Order

It is now possible to specify whether certain items, e.g. text and imported graphics, appear in front of or behind the staff. The new **Edit ▶ Order** submenu contains **Bring to Front**, **Bring Forward**, **Send Backward** and **Send to Back** items, allowing you to change the draw order of a selected object. To reset an item back to its original position in the draw order, choose **Edit ▶ Order ▶ Reset to Default**.

You can also adjust the current layer of an object using the new **Custom order** option on the **General** panel of Properties, which allows you to quickly set an object to a particular layer (between 1 and 32).

5.15 Preferences

The following new options have been added to the **File ▶ Preferences** dialog (in the Sibelius menu on Mac):

- **Display** page: new **Toolbar** controls, allowing the user to choose which groups of toolbar buttons should appear on Sibelius's toolbar (see **Look and feel** on page 46)
- **Files** page: new options to determine which of the new **View ▶ Pages** options should be used when opening scores (see **5.23 View menu** below); new **If score uses Magnetic Layout, also use it in Panorama** option (see **Magnetic Layout** on page 22); new **Repair** button to repair the default file association of Sibelius scores, if required (Windows only); new **Default paper size** option (see **8.6 Document Setup** below)
- **Input Devices** page: new **Release MIDI devices on exit** option, which you should switch off if you find that you cannot restart Sibelius after quitting it unless you restart your computer (Windows only)
- New **Language** page, allowing you to change the language used for menus, dialogs etc. in your copy of Sibelius.
- **Other** page: new **Revoice Chord Diagram** should prefer user-defined chord diagrams and **Use legacy chord symbol input** checkboxes
- **Playback** page: new options for the built-in Sibelius Player (see **Playback** on page 26)
- **Textures** page: specify a different default paper and desk texture for versions saved in your score (see **Versions** on page 35)
- New **Versions** page, with options relating to the new Versions feature (see **Versions** on page 35).

When you click **OK** in the **Preferences** dialog, any changes are now saved immediately, rather than when you quit Sibelius.

Further improvements to preferences in networked Windows environments, e.g. running a multi-user license of Sibelius on a school network:

- If you are running a network version of Sibelius and you are logged in as an administrator user, an extra button will appear on the **Other** page of **Preferences** allowing you to set the current preferences as the default for all users on that machine (achieved by saving them into HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE, rather than HKEY_CURRENT_USER). Under normal circumstances, Sibelius will always try to write preferences to HKEY_CURRENT_USER; if this is prohibited by network policies, the attempt to write the preferences will simply fail silently.
- When Sibelius runs, it will always try to load preferences from HKEY_CURRENT_USER first, then HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE, and if it is unable to find preferences in either location, it will use the factory defaults.

5.16 Printing

- PDF files created via the **Save as PDF** option in **File ▶ Print** will no longer look blocky/jagged in Apple Preview (Mac only).
- When printing parts to PDF (e.g. via **File ▶ Print All Parts**), the score's filename is no longer included twice in the resulting PDF filenames (Mac only).

5.17 Properties

The following new options have been added to the various panels of the Properties window:

- **General** panel: new **Scale *n*%** control for changing the size of a selected chord or guitar scale diagram (see **2.16 Guitar scale diagrams** above); new **Custom order** controls for adjusting the draw layer of a selected object (see **5.14 Order** above); new **Magnetic Layout** controls for enabling or disabling Magnetic Layout for an individual object (see **Magnetic Layout** on page 22)
- **Playback** panel: new controls for determining the playback of individual fermatas (pauses)
- **Lines** panel: new controls for slur handles and individual slur thickness (see **2.28 Slurs** above)
- **Bars** panel: the drop-down menu of bar rest types has now been removed; repeat bars are now created using a new Keypad layout (see **2.27 Repeat bars** above), double whole note (breve) bar rests are automatically used in 4/2 time signatures, and “invisible” bar rests have been removed in favour of simply hiding regular bar rests (see **2.5 Bars and bar rests** above).
- **Notes** panel: new **Rest Y** parameter, which is now the way to move rests up and down in the staff by small amounts.

5.20 Transposing

When transposing a system passage that begins with an **Open key/atonal** key signature but which later uses a regular key signature, the **Transpose key signatures** option in **Notes ▶ Transpose** is no longer disabled, so it is possible to transpose subsequent regular key changes in the same operation.

5.23 View menu

New **View ▶ Pages** submenu, containing options for how Sibelius should lay out the pages of your score on-screen:

- **Spreads Horizontally** is the default, and is how previous versions of Sibelius have always laid out pages; pages are laid out left-to-right, with facing pages shown together.
- **Single Pages Horizontally** is a new option that lays out single pages left-to-right. This is useful for music that is not normally presented in booklet or spreads form, e.g. fan-fold parts where the first page may be numbered 1 but is not the right-hand page of a spread.
- **Spreads Vertically** is a new option that lays out pairs of pages vertically, e.g. pages 2 and 3 are shown next to each other, with pages 4 and 5 below them.
- **Single Pages Vertically** is another new option, laying the pages of your score out in a single column, with page 2 below page 1, page 3 below page 2, and so on.

Sibelius saves the **View ▶ Pages** setting for each score (and each dynamic part), and will restore your setting when re-opening the score (or part). You can control this behavior with the new options on the **Files** page of **Preferences** (see **5.15 Preferences** above).

Improvements to zooming in Sibelius 6:

- The direction of zoom when holding **Ctrl** or **⌘** and scrolling the mouse wheel has now been reversed, to become consistent with other applications. Scrolling the wheel forwards now zooms in, and scrolling it backwards now zooms out.
- It is now possible to zoom in and out by holding **⌘** and scrolling the mouse wheel on Mac.
- The rate of change when zooming in and out with the mouse wheel has been reduced, resulting in a smoother zoom.

Four other new items have been added to the **View** menu, as follows:

- **View ▶ Handles**, switched off by default. When switched on, Sibelius displays all handles on objects in light grey, making it easier to find and select them.
- **View ▶ Comments**, switched on by default. When switched on, “sticky note” comments created via **Create ▶ Comment** are shown in the score; when switched off, they are not shown.
- **View ▶ Differences Between Versions** menu item, switched on by default. When switched on, Sibelius colors the background behind objects to denote differences between versions and scores compared using the Compare window (see **Versions** on page 35).
- **View ▶ Magnetic Layout Collisions**, switched on by default. When switched on, Sibelius colors any object that collides with another object in red (see **Magnetic Layout** on page 22).

5.24 Window menu

Three new floating windows have been added to Sibelius 6: **Window ▶ Compare** is for comparing versions and scores (see **Versions** on page 35), and **Window ▶ Keyboard** and **Window ▶ Fretboard** are on-screen representations of a piano keyboard and a guitar fretboard respectively (see **Keyboard and Fretboard windows** on page 40).

Window ▶ Tile Horizontally and **Tile Vertically** have been added to the Mac version of Sibelius.

Improvements to the Navigator window:

- The Navigator now reflects whether the pages are laid out horizontally or vertically (see **5.23 View menu** above).

- The Navigator no longer shows any “white space” at the right-hand side of the window when viewing the last pages of a score at very low zoom levels.

6.1 Working with plug-ins

If you are interested in writing your own plug-ins, you will find updated and reorganized documentation for Sibelius's built-in Manuscript language by choosing **Help ▶ Documentation ▶ Manuscript Language Reference**. Manuscript itself has been substantially expanded in Sibelius 6; full details of the new features can be found in the Manuscript documentation.

6.2 Accidentals plug-ins

Plug-ins ▶ Accidentals ▶ Respell Flats as Sharps and Respell Sharps as Flats now always correctly respell all notes in chords.

6.3 Analysis plug-ins

Plug-ins ▶ Analysis ▶ Compare Staves now notices differences in objects that are hidden on one staff, or cue-sized on one staff.

6.4 Batch Processing plug-ins

- New **Plug-ins ▶ Batch Processing ▶ Convert Folder of Scores to Earlier Version** plug-in, which allows you to export a folder of Sibelius 6 scores in Sibelius 5, Sibelius 4, Sibelius 3 or Sibelius 2 format.
- New **Plug-ins ▶ Batch Processing ▶ Export Each Staff as Audio** plug-in, which allows you to export each staff of your score as a separate audio file, suitable for importing into a project in another sequencer or DAW such as Pro Tools.
- **Convert Folder of Acorn Sibelius Files**, **Convert Folder of Finale Files** and **Convert Folder of SCORE Files** have all been removed from the **Plug-ins ▶ Batch Processing** subfolder, because Sibelius 6 can no longer convert files in these formats.

6.5 Chord Symbols plug-ins

Plug-ins ▶ Chord Symbols ▶ Add Chord Symbols and **Plug-ins ▶ Chord Symbols ▶ Chord Symbols as Fractions** have been rewritten to create new chord symbol objects.

6.6 Composing Tools plug-ins

New **Plug-ins ▶ Composing Tools ▶ Insert Note or Rest** plug-in, allowing you to insert a note or rest before, change the duration of, or delete, an existing note, chord or rest, and shuffle the following music along by the appropriate amount.

6.7 Notes and Rests plug-ins

- **Plug-ins ▶ Notes and Rests ▶ Boomwhacker Note Colors** has been rewritten to no longer use the Pitch Spectrum feature; instead it now colors the notes directly in the score. The plug-in will only color single notes correctly; if you run the plug-in on chords, all notes in the chord will end up the same color.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Notes and Rests ▶ Copy Articulations and Slurs** can now copy scoops, falls, doits and plops as well as regular articulations on notes.

6.8 Other plug-ins

- **Plug-ins ▶ Other ▶ Split Bar** has been updated. It now allows you to choose what kind of barline should be used at the point at which the bar is split (by default, invisible).
- New **Plug-ins ▶ Other ▶ Merge Bars** plug-in, which acts as a counterpart to **Split Bar**.

6.10 Proof-reading plug-ins

- New **Plug-ins ▶ Proof-reading ▶ Check First Species Counterpoint** plug-in, which checks first species (two voices, note-against-note) counterpoint for errors, according to the rules in Fux's *Gradus ad Parnassum*.
- New **Plug-ins ▶ Proof-reading ▶ Check Redundancies** plug-in, which checks for successive identical clefs, time signatures, instrument changes, rehearsal marks, and key signatures, providing a means to hide or delete them.

6.11 Simplify Notation plug-ins

- **Plug-ins ▶ Simplify Notation ▶ Remove Rests** no longer fails with an error on some scores.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Simplify Notation ▶ Renotate Performance** now works correctly in scores that begin with a pick-up (upbeat) bar.

6.12 Text plug-ins

- New **Plug-ins ▶ Text ▶ Add Dynamics From Live Playback** plug-in, which automatically adds appropriate Expression text dynamics to the score based on the Live Playback velocities of the notes; this is especially useful for quickly adding dynamics to imported MIDI files.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Text ▶ Find and Replace Text** has been updated. It no longer fails if the same word has to be replaced several times within the same string, it now preserves line breaks in multi-line text objects (though other formatting such as bold, italic, underline is lost), and it also allows you to choose the color to be used when highlighting changed text in the score.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Text ▶ Number Bars** has been revamped with more options, and now once more restarts numbering at rehearsal marks and special barlines if desired.

6.13 Transformations plug-ins

- Nine new plug-ins in the new **Plug-ins ▶ Transformations** subfolder, designed to provide useful tools for modifying melodic material in a variety of ways:
 - **Augment Intervals**: increases the intervals between successive notes in the selection by a specified amount.
 - **Diminish Intervals**: reduces the intervals between successive notes in the selection by a specified amount.
 - **Randomize Pitches**: replaces the existing pitches in the selection with new, randomly-generated pitches.
 - **Retrograde Pitches**: rewrites the selection such that the order of pitches is reversed (so the last pitch becomes the first, the penultimate pitch becomes the second, and so on) without changing the durations of the notes.
 - **Retrograde Rhythms**: rewrites the selection such that the order of rhythms is reversed (so the duration of the last note becomes the duration of the first, and so on) without changing the pitches of the notes.

- **Retrograde Rhythms and Pitches:** rewrites the selection such that both the order of pitches and rhythms is reversed.
- **Rotate Rhythms:** rewrites the selection such that the durations of the notes are shifted rightwards by one note (so the duration of the last note becomes the duration of the first, the duration of the first note becomes the duration of the second, and so on), without changing the pitches of the notes.
- **Rotate Rhythms and Pitches:** rewrites the selection such that both the durations and pitches of notes in the selection are shifted rightwards by one note (so the last note of the selection becomes the first note, the first note becomes the second note, and so on).
- **Shuffle Pitches:** rewrites the selection such that the existing pitches of the notes are randomly redistributed, changing the melodic contour in random ways but without introducing new pitches.

All of these plug-ins operate on a selected passage and most do not show a dialog; those that do show a dialog will only show it the first time they run in a session, and not thereafter. They are designed such that you can run them repeatedly on a selection to continue transforming the music. Note that for those plug-ins where rhythms can be changed, tuplets are always moved as a complete unit, and grace notes are always moved along with the notes to which they belong.

- **Double Note Values** and **Halve Note Values** have been moved from the **Notes and Rests** subfolder and **Invert**, **Pitch Mapping**, **Retrograde** and **Transform Scale** have been moved from the **Composing Tools** subfolder to round out the **Transformations** suite of plug-ins.
- **Plug-ins ▶ Transformations ▶ Retrograde** has been improved such that it can run on selections that begin and/or end with partial bars.

7.1 Working with parts

Creating a part in a score containing many bars with multiple voices should now be equivalent in speed to the same case with only one voice.

7.3 Multiple Part Appearance

The message that appears when you click the **Multiple Part Appearance** button in the **Parts** window with one or more parts selected has been changed and a **Don't say this again** checkbox has been added.

7.4 Extracting parts

- **Layout ▶ Break ▶ Split System** (e.g. for gaps before codas) is now correctly maintained when extracting a dynamic part.
- Page number changes are no longer lost when extracting dynamic parts as separate files.

8.4 Auto Breaks

Layout ▶ Auto Layout has been renamed as **Layout ▶ Auto Breaks** in Sibelius 6.

8.6 Document Setup

- A new option has been added to the **Files** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the **Sibelius** menu on Mac) allowing you to choose whether Sibelius should use **European** (A4, A3, etc.) or **US** (Letter, Tabloid, etc.) paper sizes by default when starting a new score, or importing a MIDI, PhotoScore or MusicXML file.

- When adding or removing instruments from the score via **Create ▶ Instruments**, Sibelius now offers to adjust the staff and/or page size automatically in order to prevent pages becoming either overcrowded or too sparse.

8.8 House Style

House Style ▶ Import House Style has been modified to make the dependencies between different house style elements clearer, and **Select None** and **Select All** buttons have been added for convenience.

8.9 Note spacing

New options in House Style ▶ Note Spacing Rule:

- You can now choose whether empty bars should be spaced according to a fixed number of spaces (as in previous versions of Sibelius) or according to the rhythmic duration of the bar, which some engravers prefer. To use this new spacing, choose the **Empty bar width determined by time signature** radio button (chosen by default in newly-created scores).
- New **Gap between chord symbols *n* spaces** option, defaulting to 1 space. This is the minimum distance between chord symbols that Sibelius will attempt to ensure when respacing music.
- New **Before arpeggio line *n* spaces** option, defaulting to 0.5 spaces, to specify the minimum distance before a note-attached arpeggio line (see **2.2 Arpeggios** above).

Layout ▶ Reset Note Spacing is now on average twice as fast as it was in Sibelius 5.

The spacing of parentheses around notes now correctly takes into account accidentals on notes in multiple voices.

8.10 Staff spacing

New Layout ▶ Optimize Staff Spacing feature, which adjusts the space between staves such that there are no collisions between items above and below the staff. The minimum horizontal and vertical distance that Sibelius should attempt to maintain when adjusting staves is defined on the Staves page of House Style ▶ Engraving Rules.

Other new controls on the Staves page of House Style ▶ Engraving Rules:

- ***n* extra spaces between groups of staves** provides an extra gap between the bottom staff joined by one bracket or brace and the staff directly below.
- ***n*extra spaces below vocal staves (for lyrics)** provides an extra gap between a vocal instrument's staff and the staff directly below. Whether or not this value has any effect for a given staff is determined by whether the initial instrument type of the staff has the new **Vocal staff** option switched on (see **8.14 Edit Instruments** below).
- ***n*extra spaces above for System Object Positions** provides an extra gap above a staff that is selected in House Style ▶ System Object Positions, so that e.g. Tempo text is less likely to collide with the staff above. This does not affect the top staff in the score (which always shows system objects but should not normally collide with anything above it).
- **Justify both staves of grand staff instruments** determines whether or not the distance between two (or more) braced staves belonging to the same instrument (e.g. two piano staves) should be subject to vertical justification.

- **Justify all staves of multi-staff instruments** determines whether or not the distance between staves belonging to the same instrument (e.g. Flute (a), Flute (b), Flute (c)) should be subject to vertical justification.

When exporting a Sibelius 6 score to Sibelius 5 or earlier format, the staff spacing provided by the new “extra spaces” options is preserved when the score is opened in the earlier version, but the changes in staff spacing produced by the **Justify...** checkboxes are not preserved if either of these options is switched off.

When moving a staff vertically for the first time, or immediately after having used **Layout ▶ Reset Space Above Staff**, the staff no longer jumps downwards by too large a distance.

8.11 Music fonts

Sibelius for Mac is now supplied with OpenType versions of the Opus, Inkpen2, Reprise and Helsinki font families, providing improved compatibility with Mac OS X 10.6 Snow Leopard.

Furthermore, there have been many improvements to the chord symbols fonts, including:

- New characters have been added to Opus Chords, Opus PlainChords, Opus Chords Sans, Opus Chords Sans Condensed, Inkpen2 Chords and Reprise Chords to support various new combinations of stacked alterations, required by the improvements to chord symbols.
- A double sharp character has been added to the Reprise Chords font.
- The superscript capital M character in Opus Chords, Opus Chords Sans, Opus Chords Sans Condensed, Inkpen2 Chords and Reprise Chords has been reduced in size such that it is the same size as the baseline small capital M.
- Improvements to the spacing of various characters in the chord symbol fonts, including removing the trailing space from “OMIT” in Reprise Chords, improved alignment of three-high accidental stacks in all chord symbols fonts, and improved spacing of capital “SUS” in all chord symbols fonts.

Finally, the Reprise Script font now includes Icelandic thorn, German Eszett, and French OE characters, and the appearance of the scoop and fall symbols in Reprise Special has also been improved.

8.12 Default Positions

The new **Different default position on vocal staves** option in **House Style ▶ Default Positions** allows you to specify that objects like Expression text and hairpins should go above the staff on vocal staves, but below for other kinds of instruments. This takes effect for instrument types that have the new **Vocal staff** option switched on – see **8.14 Edit Instruments** below.

8.14 Edit Instruments

New options in the **New/Edit Instrument** dialog:

- **Vocal staff** checkbox: for instrument types for which this option is switched on, Sibelius can allow extra space below the staff to accommodate lyrics (see **8.10 Staff spacing** above) and position Expression text and hairpins above the staff by default (see **8.12 Default Positions** above).

- **Tab instrument to use for chord symbols** option: allows you to specify which guitar tab instrument should be used for chord diagrams displayed above that instrument (see **Chord symbols** on page 42). By default, all instruments will display chord diagrams as if written for a 6-string guitar tuned in the standard fashion, except for the notation versions of various fretted instruments that use alternative tunings, which are set to produce chord diagrams for those specific instruments.

The message that appears when you edit an instrument already in use in the score is now a **Yes/No/Not Again** message box.

8.15 Edit Lines

- If you have a line selected when you choose **House Style ▶ Edit Lines**, the selected line style is automatically selected in the **Edit Lines** dialog.
- The list of text styles in the **Text** child dialog accessed by clicking the **Text** radio button under **Start** is now alphabetically ordered (Mac only).

8.16 Edit Noteheads

The arrow keys and mouse scroll wheel now work as expected in **House Style ▶ Edit Noteheads** (Mac only).

8.17 Edit Symbols

- It is now possible to move around the grid in **House Style ▶ Edit Symbols** with the arrow keys – see **2.31 Symbols** above.
- Clicking **Delete** with no symbol is selected in **House Style ▶ Edit Symbols** no longer causes Sibelius to crash.

9.5 Opening MIDI files

- MIDI files that contain spurious time signatures should no longer cause Sibelius to hang when it attempts to open them.
- When **Show metronome marks** is switched off in **Open MIDI File**, tempo changes in MIDI files are now imported as hidden metronome marks, rather than as regular metronome marks preceded by a tilde character (~).
- MIDI files of more than 3000 bars in length are now correctly imported.

9.6 Opening MusicXML files

- MusicXML 2.0 files are now validated against the MusicXML 2.0 W3C XML schema definition. Sibelius also continues to validate against the MusicXML 2.0 DTDs.
- Dashed and dotted slurs are now imported from MusicXML files. The **placement** and **orientation** parameters are not currently imported for slurs: slurs from MusicXML files will always follow Sibelius's default positioning rules.
- A wide variety of *n*th-ending lines are now correctly imported. If the MusicXML file specifies an ending line that does not exist by default in Sibelius, a new line style will be created to match the appearance and behavior of the ending line specified in the MusicXML file.
- Complex repeat structures including segnos, codas, D.C. and D.S. jumps are now imported from MusicXML files. Where Sibelius detects a repeat event in a MusicXML file, it will use the default

text or symbol required by Sibelius for correct playback, rather than reproducing exactly the appearance of the original MusicXML file.

- Breath marks and caesura symbols are now imported.
- Scoop, plop, doit and fall articulations are now imported.
- Upbow and downbow articulations are now imported.
- Guitar bends, hammer-ons and pull-offs are now imported.
- Pedal lines (for piano etc.) are now imported.
- Quarter-tone accidentals are now imported.
- Colored objects are now imported.
- Arpeggio lines are now imported.
- Feathered beams are now imported.
- Rhythm slashes are now imported.
- The **directive** element, used for system markings such as tempo indications, is now imported.
- Sibelius now attempts to detect page numbers in **credit** elements that recur on multiple pages, and if possible it creates a single header text object with a page number wildcard, rather than individual header text objects on each page.
- The **other-direction** element, used for miscellaneous (and typically non-printing) text, is now imported as comments.
- The **part-group** element, which describes bracket, sub-bracket, brace and barline groupings, is now imported.
- Changes of text formatting in a text object (e.g. a change to bold or italic), and music text font characters (e.g. flat and sharp symbols) in instrument names are now imported.
- Lyric lines on melismatic syllables are now created at the correct length when importing MusicXML files.
- Up-beat (pick-up) bars are now imported from MusicXML files with the correct length.
- The horizontal positioning of chord symbols imported from MusicXML files where there are chord symbols at rhythmic positions where there are no notes has been improved.
- It is now possible to open a MusicXML file when not connected to the Internet.
- In certain complex multi-voice cases, Sibelius now ensures that appropriate voices are used for notes, on the basis that the highest pitches should use voices with stems pointing up, and the lowest pitches should use voices with stems pointing down.
- Octave (8va) lines are now imported.
- A problem whereby Sibelius would sometimes fail to import MusicXML files that contain metronome marks has been fixed.

9.7 Opening scores from previous versions

The **Update Score** dialog that appears when you open a score created in an earlier version of Sibelius has various new options (e.g. to enable Magnetic Layout, to convert existing chord symbol text into new chord symbol objects, to maintain custom beaming, etc.).

Refer to this topic in Sibelius Reference for suggestions of further adjustments you may want to consider making to scores created in earlier versions of Sibelius.

9.8 Exporting graphics

- New **Anti-aliased** checkbox in **File ▶ Export ▶ Graphics** to determine whether or not exported color or grayscale bitmap graphics should be anti-aliased.
- When exporting EPS files, to export any embedded TIFF files in the score as 8-bit grayscale images, switch off **Include colored objects**. When this option is switched on, all TIFF files will be exported as 24-bit color images, even if they are monochrome or grayscale.
- Sibelius can now embed OpenType fonts in exported EPS files.
- It is now possible to export bitmap graphics of whole pages at high resolutions, e.g. 600dpi or greater (Windows only).
- Page number wildcards in text are now correctly substituted when exporting graphics, both via copy and paste and via **File ▶ Export ▶ Graphics**.

9.9 Exporting MIDI files

- New **Omit muted instruments** option in the **Export MIDI File** dialog, switched on by default. When switched on, Sibelius omits any instruments that are muted in the Mixer from the exported MIDI file; when switched off, Sibelius exports all instruments in the score into the MIDI file.
- New **Export pick-up bars as full bars padded with rests** checkbox in the **Export MIDI File** dialog, switched on by default. Sibelius has always exported pick-up (upbeat) bars at the start of the score as a full bar padded with rests at the start of the bar, which works well for playback. However, if you are exporting a MIDI file from Sibelius for the purposes of using it as a tempo track in a sequencer or DAW for ReWire sync, it is more useful to export an initial pick-up bar as a short bar with a different time signature than the first full bar. Improvements up to Sibelius 5.2.5

The following is a list of the most important improvements made up to Sibelius 5.2.5. In general, bug fixes are not listed here.

Improvements are annotated (v2), (v3), (v4) or (v5), depending on which version they were added in. If you are upgrading from Sibelius 1.x, then in addition to the new features of Sibelius 6, you also get the more than 800 improvements introduced in Sibelius 2, Sibelius 3 and Sibelius 4.

Feature	Improvements
Accidentals	Improved positioning of accidentals in chords (v2), and ability to hide them (v3).
Arrange™	Saves time arranging and orchestrating by copying music intelligently into combinations of instruments, with over 140 included styles (including “explode” and “reduction”), and the ability to create your own (v2)
Articulations	Articulations can be flipped, are automatically positioned at the stem ends of notes, and are centered on the stem when they are at the stem end of a note (v2)
Barlines	Early music barlines (barlines between staves, tick, short) and option to set default barline type (v2)

Appendix B: Menu changes

The main menu changes from Sibelius 5 to Sibelius 6, excluding entirely new menu items, are:

- **View ▶ Note Colors ▶ Pitch Spectrum** has been removed, because Sibelius 6 no longer includes the pitch spectrum feature.
- **Create ▶ Chord Diagram** has been renamed as **Create ▶ Chord Symbol** (and **Create ▶ Text ▶ Chord symbol** has been removed).
- **Create ▶ Other ▶ Extra Slur Arc** has been removed, because S-shaped slurs are now created using regular slurs.

The main menu changes from Sibelius 4 to Sibelius 5 were:

- **Create ▶ Other ▶ Staff Type Change** and **Transposition Change** were replaced by **Create ▶ Other ▶ Instrument Change**.
- Various **Play** menu options were removed, and input device settings were moved to the new **Input Devices** page of **File ▶ Preferences** (in the Sibelius menu on Mac).
- **Layout ▶ Focus on Staves** was moved to the **View** menu.
- **Layout ▶ Instruments and Staves** was moved back to **Create ▶ Instruments**.

Main menu changes from Sibelius 3 to Sibelius 4:

- Sibelius 4 introduced a single multi-page **File ▶ Preferences** dialog (in the Sibelius menu on Mac), combining a number of other dialogs from earlier versions, including **View ▶ Smoothing** and **View ▶ Textures**, as well as various new options
- All operations for exporting files – e.g. for saving in earlier versions of Sibelius, or as a MIDI file, or a graphics file, and so on – are done via the **File ▶ Export** submenu, instead of via **File ▶ Save As**
- **House Style ▶ Use Multirests** was moved into the **Layout ▶ Auto Breaks** dialog, but the shortcut **Ctrl+Shift+M** or **⇧⌘M** remains.

Main menu changes from Sibelius 2 to Sibelius 3:

- The list of files you've worked on recently was moved to the **Files ▶ Open Recent Files** submenu, and was increased to 10 files
- The **Create** menu was simplified, with the less-often used items moved to the **Create ▶ Other** submenu.

Main menu changes from Sibelius 1.x to Sibelius 2:

- **Flexi-time** was moved to the **Notes** menu
- **Espressivo**, **Swing** and **Reverb** were moved to **Play ▶ Performance**
- Several items from the **View** menu were moved to the **Window** menu
- The **File ▶ House Style** dialog was renamed as **Engraving Rules** and moved to the new **House Style** menu, along with new features for editing all aspects of a score's house style.
